MESSAGE FROM THE DIRECTOR

MESSAGE DU DIRECTEUR

Once again, The Royal Regiment of Canadian Artillery has had a busy and rewarding year, particularly in the realm of international and domestic operations. 1RCHA and 2RCHA provided significant augmentation for the rotations to the Canadian Contingent to SFOR, and in response to the wrath of Mother Nature, our Regular and Reserve units performed admirably during the infamous Red River flood and the ice storm of the century in Eastern Canada. We can be proud of the professionalism and dedication demonstrated by our soldiers throughout these operations. They earned the highest respect and confidence from the public domain, both at home and abroad. Again, well done to all those who participated!

This past year also marked some significant progress in terms of equipment and infrastructure. Delivery of the LG1 is now complete, and from all reports, it is proving to be an excellent addition to our field units. As well, Reserve units are starting to see the delivery of their C3 howitzers. After many years of planning and waiting, construction of the new 1RCHA complex was finally completed and the Regiment, at last, is housed in a state-of-the-art facility.

Restructure and re-engineering continue within the Army and The Royal Regiment has not escaped unscathed. The Home Station has been reduced from the status of a Base to that of an Area Support Unit. The rank of the Commander Home Station has been downgraded to Lieutenant-Colonel, and there is no longer an artillery Chief Warrant Officer in Shilo. Despite this setback, the Home Station still provides excellent support for Regimental Affairs, the RCA Museum and the RCA Kit shop. The Land Force Reserve Restructure also continues, albeit at a slow pace. Artillery Reserve units have demonstrated strong resolve to prove the viability of their respective Regiments and they are encouraged to keep up their good work.

After a drought of NCM promotions, I am please to note that we are now returning to a period of more

Le Régiment royal de l'Artillerie canadienne a encore été très actif cette année, particulièrement dans le domaine des opérations nationales et internationales. Le 1 RCHA et le 2 RCHA ont fourni des renforts au Contingent canadien de la SFOR et, par suite des colères de dame nature, les unités de la Force régulière et de la Réserve ont participé aux opérations de lutte contre les inondations de la rivière Rouge ainsi qu'aux opérations de secours aux sinistrés de la fameuse tempête de verglas qui a frappé l'Est du pays. Pendant la dernière année, nous avons fait des progrès appréciables en matière d'équipement et d'infrastructure. La distribution du LG1 est maintenant terminée, et selon les rapports qui nous sont transmis, les unités de campagne en sont très satisfaites. De plus, les unités de la Réserve commencent à recevoir les obusiers C3. Après de nombreuses années de planification et de délais, la construction du complexe du 1 RCHA est maintenant terminée et le Régiment est finalement installé dans un édifice moderne.

Le Régiment royal n'a pas échappé à la restructuration et à la réorganisation de la Force terrestre. Sa base est devenue une unité de soutien de Secteur. Elle est maintenant commandée par un lieutenant-colonel et le poste d'adjudant-chef de l'artillerie de la base de Shilo a été aboli. En dépit de ce recul, la base continue de fournir un soutien efficace aux activités régimentaires, au Musée de l'ARC et au magasin de fourniment de l'ARC. La restructuration de la Réserve de la Force terrestre se poursuit, quoique lentement. Les unités d'artillerie de la Réserve ont montré qu'elles étaient déterminées à prouver la viabilité de leurs régiments respectifs et nous les encourageons à poursuivre dans cette voie.

steady advancement. Unfortunately, I cannot say the same for the officers, particularly for promotions from Captain to Major. Through proactive measures, we have managed to generate some trickle promotions to Major despite being over our Preferred Manning Level.

The RCA Executive Committee made a considerable effort last year to revitalize the programs within the Regimental Fund (such as the bursaries program, the emergency assistance program, the distribution of splash suits, and more) by launching a campaign to improve the number of members donating into the fund. As I asked last year, please contribute to the RCA Fund if you are not doing so already - the success of our programs and services depends on it.

For those who might not be aware, the Artillery National Memorial in Ottawa was relocated from Major's Hill Park to Green Island Park on Sussex Drive. In May, the Memorial was rededicated by The Right Honourable Antonio Lamer, Chief Justice of the Supreme Court of Canada, in a special ceremony. The new site provides a superb setting to honor the gunners who have gone before us and made the ultimate sacrifice. I encourage all of you to take the time to visit the Memorial if you happen to be in the Ottawa area.

With my term as Director of Artillery ending in August, this Forward for the Canadian Gunner will be my last. Therefore, I wish to thank the Colonel Commandant and the members of Artillery Council for their wise counsel and guidance over the last three years. I also wish to thank all of the members of the RCAA and the RCAA Executive Committee for all of their support. I applaud all Commanding Officers and their RSMs for their superb work in maintaining high standards within their respective units. As well, I thank them for their honest and frank feedback to me on a variety of issues. To the Regimental Headquarters, I have appreciated the work they have done in assuming the function of Regimental Affairs from me, and for once again producing another excellent publication of the Canadian Gunner. And finally, I would like to congratulate all members of The Royal Regiment of Canadian Artillery for maintaining their focus, preserving their professionalism, and retaining a sense of humor during a time of great change and turbulence. It has been a privilege to serve as your Director.



REGIMENTAL HEADQUARTERS RCA

1997 saw a number of significant changes in RHQ RCA. These included a new Regimental Major and a number of organizational changes aimed at increasing the effectiveness of both RHQ and the RCA Kit Shop. In Sep 97, a new computer was leased in order to provide RHQ RCA with its own desktop publishing capability. The intent was to complete all setup of the Quadrant and The Canadian Gunner in house in order to save significant printing setup charges. Instead of giving the paper articles, photos and advertising contracts to the printer to sort out, we are now giving them 99.5% cameraready electronic files. The net cost savings to the RCA Regimental Fund should exceed \$5000 per year through this initiative.

The lease of the computer, and the posting in of some very capable and computer-literate staff from 1 RCHA also allowed RHQ RCA to develop and publish its own web site in Dec 97 (located on the internet at **www.artillery.net**). Our challenge in coming years will be to keep the site as dynamic and interesting as possible.

Units are highly encouraged to forward articles for publication onto both the web and in the Quadrant on a regular basis. If files are forwarded to us electronically, ensure that photos are saved at high resolution (minimum 300 dpi), and that the files are sent to our internet address: regtmaj@artillery.net . Articles can be sent electronically via the AWAN, however, we are not allowed to have the publishing computer on the LAN. As we have to transfer the files to the other computer by floppy diskette, files sent over the AWAN have to be limited to 1.4MB or less in size.

RHQ RCA also began the development of a comprehensive Regimental database which will be up and running by Spring 1998. This will provide us with a much better capability in the future to provide the units with reliable information concerning the Regimental Fund, personnel lists, etc. Units are asked to cooperate by providing us with regular updates to changes of COs, RSMs, Honorary Cols and Honorary LCols, as well as changes to telephones, addresses, etc.





1ST REGIMENT ROYAL CANADIAN HORSE ARTILLERY


As with every year, 1997 was eventful and challenging for the soldiers of Canada's First Regiment. The Great Manitoba "Flood of the Century" will form a significant part of the memories of '97, as will the revival of a busy and focused combined arms training plan. Operation PALLADIUM saw more than 90 soldiers from the Regiment selected to augment two different battle groups deployed to Bosnia while at home, work neared completion on the new building complex for 1 RCHA. A Battery found the Kingston Cup and defended it, B Battery trekked to the frozen north on a sovereignty operation and C Battery became the first in Canada to be equipped with the new Light Gun. On the sports and activities side, the Regiment actively (and in many cases, victoriously) participated in Brigade and unit organized sporting events, adventurous training, and various community athletic competitions. The summer season brought with it a change of command for the Regiment and for two of its batteries while the autumn saw the resurgence of the combined arms team in 1 CMBG. Now for the details of the whirlwind that was 1997....

The first two months were busy but relatively stable. After Christmas leave, most soldiers returned with only one thing on their mind - the Brigade sports competition. EX STRONG CONTENDER tests the mettle of 1 CMBG's finest athletes in the fields of

volleyball, broomball, floor hockey, and ice hockey. 1 RCHA emerged victorious from this week long series of events, winning the overall top unit prize by taking first place in all but one sport. Our soldiers walked away with their heads held high and respected as arguably the best conditioned, hardest hitting (yes - even in volleyball), and most competitive soldiers in 1 CMBG!

Though Ex STRONG CONTENDER was on the minds of many soldiers after regaling the New Year, last January saw the first of two contingents of Shilo Gunners deploy to Bosnia. Early in the month, 24 members of the Regiment joined the 2 PPCLI Battle Group on Op PALLADIUM in the form of a BC's party and two FOO/FAC teams in addition to several individual augmentees. In consistent gunner fashion, these troops performed admirably in varying capacities throughout SFOR's Multi-National Division (South West) and were referred to as "an essential part of the 2 PPCLI Battle Group team."

While its BC and FOO parties were headed for the Balkans, January saw the remainder of B Battery (along with several other members of the Regiment) heading in the opposite direction: north to Repulse Bay, NWT on Sovereignty Operation 9701. In addition to exercising our ability to place troops anywhere in Canada, the operation allowed for interaction with the Canadian Rangers and arctic survival training actually *in* the Arctic






In February C Battery ran the first LG1 conversion course and trained a nucleus of Gunners who put the first rounds from our new guns down range on 17 February marking a new era for 1 RCHA - no longer just "mech warriors" we were happy and proud to welcome the new "light fighters" of C Battery to the fold.

In what would become the second contingent

of 1 RCHA troops off to Bosnia in 1997, the Regiment received warning in February that it was to provide personnel to augment the second rotation of Op PALLADIUM. This time, the Gunners would become part of the LdSH (RC) Battle Group destined for Bosnia in July. For this tour, a Mortar Troop was provided in addition to the affiliated BC and FOO/FAC teams. More individual augmentation was tasked until, by the time of deployment, some 68 1 RCHA personnel were to become honorary Strathconas until January 1998. In preparation for this deployment, on 18 March 1 RCHA began EX PRAIRIE GUNNER 9701 with an aim to refresh and hone gunnery

skills and to allow some PCF courses to perform final exercises in a Regimental context. Although cold temperatures played havoc with the initial few days, the exercise progressed well and the level of proficiency achieved in such a short time was impressive.

According to the training plan, this paragraph should have been dedicated to the outstanding support the Regiment provided to the Artillery School's BC's Course; however, the "raging Red River" of Manitoba changed all that. On the eve of deploying to the field in support of the Artillery School, the Regiment was bugged out to deploy to Winnipeg and the rural areas south of

the city in what would be called Op ASSISTANCE. In several weeks, most of Canada's Army would be fighting the flood waters or supporting the effort to some degree, but for 1 RCHA, the suffering of our neighbouring Manitobans hit close to home.

As one of the first units to deploy to the "water zone", the Regiment spent its time on the operation in the Rural Municipalities of MacDonald and Morris. It is worth noting at this point that 1 RCHA had (among others) E Battery, 2 RCHA under its command for nearly two weeks during the build up of troops from across Canada. Assisting farm and homeowners in their individual




Capt Frederick Wolanski (C BTY) is receiving a brief during EX MAFEKING GUNNER in Sep 97

defences was initially the focus of our efforts, but the plans for the now famous Brunkhild Dike created new priorities. Flood Battery (an amalgamation of A, B and C Batteries, task organized for the operation) along with E Battery and the rest of the Regiment, worked around the clock in arduous, often dangerous conditions on this feat of engineering that many said would be impossible to complete. Thankfully, the full brunt of the floodwater never threatened the dike but its construction gave thousands of citizens a sense of security and piece of mind. If not for the tireless efforts of the soldiers of 1 RCHA and E Battery, the dike could not have been completed.

Many stories (legends?) grew out of the Flood of '97 and are too numerous to recount here. Some memories worthy of quick mention include the lone liaison officer left in Rosenort who ate the Regiment's allocation of IMPs; Flood Battery's occupation of the Lasalle School ("BK Out!"); and who could forget Capt "Tex" Wolanski's contribution to morale in the form of a surprise appearance by country music star Michelle Wright.

After the floodwaters had subsided and the Regiment returned to Shilo, Lieutenant Colonel Steve Gillies began to count the days until 27 June when command of the Regiment was handed over to Lieutenant Colonel Mark Hodgson. This period of transition also saw command of B Battery pass from Major Mark MacDonald to Major Marc George. As well, HQ and Services Battery BC, Major Bart Gauvin, passed command to Major Lyle Herod. Also welcomed to the unit were two newly promoted BSMs in the form of MWO Malcolm Angus (B Battery) and MWO Dan McKinnon (C Battery). MWO Al Critchley proudly assumed the post of BSM A Battery as MWO Ron Benoit moved across to become BSM Headquarters and Services Battery.

2ND REGIMENT ROYAL CANADIAN HORSE ARTILLERY

As another year passes, it is time to reflect on the challenges and successes of the 2nd Regiment. 2 RCHA exists to provide and coordinate battle winning firepower to 2 CMBG and its manoeuvre units. This is accomplished through a rigorous training schedule combined with sport, recreational and family activities. Once again we have had an exciting year. From California to Newfoundland, and from Gagetown to Winnipeg, soldiers of the 2nd Regiment saw one of their busiest years in recent memory.

In January after a long and refreshing Christmas break, the members of the Regiment returned to Petawawa to begin winter warfare training at the battery and troop level. Activities included tent routine, demonstrations and familiarization in winter fieldcraft, snowshoeing, and winter survival. The month concluded with winter warfare exercises in the Petawawa training area

HQ Battery participated on a SOVOP at the end of January. Ex QUALLUNAAG GUNNER was a two-week exercise in Holmann, NWT. Led by Major Nauss and MWO Moyles, the soldiers departed on three C-130 Hercules aircraft arriving North of 60 on schedule. HQ Battery's activities conducted in Holmann included arctic survival and navigation. It was the first time in thirteen years that the military had visited this part of the arctic.

Unconfirmed reports state that Major Nauss was presented with an opportunity to hone his pathfinder skills when he fell off the rear of the CO's snowmobile and was required to navigate through a snow storm the few kilometres back to the camp.

The final event during January was the initial delivery of the new GIAT LG1 105mm light gun to 2 RCHA. F Battery converted to the new light gun, which replaced the C1 in the Regular Force inventory. Conversion courses were conducted to bring the entire battery up to speed on their new colours. The training went quite well until Major Beler ordered the soldiers to remove the bubble wrap from their guns during their first deployment to the field.

Reciprocal Unit Exchanges were conducted with US Marine Artillery Regiments in both Camp Pendelton, California and Camp Lejuene, North Carolina. During Ex LEATHERNECK, D Battery travelled to California to participate in an array of activities with the 11th Marine Regiment. These included an amphibious assault, MOUT training (Military Operations in Urban Terrain), M198 familiarization (American 155MM Towed Howitzer), and helops including parachuting and SPIE rigging. The D Battery soldiers had an outstanding time and would not be too upset if they were required to return to California.

On Ex SEMPER UBIQUE, E Battery travelled to North Carolina to participate in activities with the 10th Marine Regiment at Camp Lejuene. The activities included F.A.T.S. training (Firearm training simulator), a company advance, MOUT training, and familiarization with the M-198. A highlight of the trip was a visit and tour of the USS North Carolina.

While D and E Batteries headed south, F Battery hosted K Battery, 11 Marine Regiment from Camp Pendelton, California. The Marines participated in LG1 familiarization, winter warfare training, snowshoeing, and snow defenses. Both the Canadian and American troops had an outstanding time as many of the Marines had never seen snow.

Once again March was a very intense month. The 2nd Regiment confirmed its gunnery skills with Ex FROZEN GUN. This is a Regimental level exercise that tests the entire regiment in deployment and shooting skills. The exercise progressed quickly to include fire planning at a very high level. The challenges were frequent as both LCol Beare and Mother Nature combined to ensure the exercise tested the skills of every soldier. The exercise was a combined arms effort, which included the whole of the 3rd Battalion Royal Canadian Regiment, a Leopard squadron from the Royal Canadian Dragoons, a sapper squadron, 427 Tactical Helicopter Squadron and 1 Canadian Division Electronic Warfare Squadron. The exercise concluded with a Battle Group live fire defensive action with guns, mortars, FGA, armour and infantry combining their efforts in a symphony of fire.

While preparing to depart Petawawa to participate on Ex EASTERN THUNDER, the Brigade received a warning order to prepare to fight the floods in Manitoba. OP ASSISTANCE was the military effort to aid in flood relief along the Red River. The Regiment

flew an advanced element under Major Doyle and MWO Robinson to Brunkild, Domain and Sanford, Manitoba while the rest of the Brigade deployed by road. For three weeks the soldiers worked long hours under extremely difficult circumstances in order to support the relief effort. After days of sandbagging, the river eventually began to drop. Our soldiers were grateful and proud to do their part to help Canadians in need.

Concurrent with OP ASSISTANCE and as part of the Canadian contribution to NATO's AMF(L) Force, F Battery (AMF(L)) deployed on Ex ARDENT GROUND in Pinarishar, Turkey. This was the Royal Regiment's first off shore exercise with the new LG1 howitzer. From 27 April to 21 May, F Battery fired with batteries from all of the NATO contingents, impressing everyone, in particular the force commander, with their speed and accuracy. All of the participants marveled at the skill of the Battery and showed interest as to how the guns could respond so quickly. At the conclusion of the exercise the other batteries were amazed to find that F Battery had been firing using manual CP procedures throughout the exercise. An AMF(L) sports day concluded Ex ARDENT GROUND. F Battery did extremely well, defeating all contenders in the Tug of War competition and placing high in all of the other events.

June brought us to the annual Regimental Competition. This event allows our soldiers to participate in a friendly competition for bragging rights. This year the best OP Party was G31 consisting of Captain Bernard, MBdr Beaudry, Bdr Buchan, and Gnr Gonthier, and the best gun detachment went to MBdr McLean's detachment of 25F, earning the honour of flying the CO's pennant.

On 20 June the annual Ironman competition was held at CFB Petawawa . This is an endurance event that





challenges members of 2 CMBG to a 33 km run, 4.5 km canoe portage, 11 km paddle, and a 5 km sprint all with the added stress of a 40 lb rucksack. The 2 RCHA team led by MWO Morretti placed very well. The other members of the Regiment competing in the event were Cpl Lorimer, Bdr LeCoz, Bdr Ings, Bdr Peckford, and Cpl Holloway.

June is also the time of year that the Regiment participates in various forms of adventure training. F Battery conducted its annual Dispersed Flight competition encouraging soldiers to travel as far within Canada as possible on \$10, a change of clothes and a letter from the CO. This year's winners were Bdr Attrux and Bdr Appel who made it to Victoria and back within the week allocated. They actually returned with more money than what they had received to begin with, thanks to the generosity of some fellow gunners at 1 RCHA.

The 2 RCHA Gun Race team once again trained hard for another series of demonstrations. This time the team would travel to Newfoundland to participate in Cabot 500 celebrations across the Island. Our team, led by WO Lizotte, was outstanding and instilled a great sense of pride in all those who saw the performance. The feedback received at the Regiment was very positive, as the team impressed everyone who attended. 


show there. On their return, our Brigade Commander, BGen Hillier, commented that he now had a number of nieces that wanted to marry gunners...and a couple that would now have to. It is hoped that the 2 RCHA Gun Race team will deploy to Edinburgh, Scotland for the Edinburgh Tattoo in 1999.

The end of June saw the Regiment return to Kingston to participate in Freedom of the City celebrations which were cut short in 1996. The town council voted to disallow the static and dynamic displays that were planned for Freedom of the City 96, and overturned this decision with too little time for the Regiment to prepare. The Regiment was asked by Mayor Gary Bennett to return to Kingston to furnish the static displays. The displays were a big hit and thousands of Kingstonians and visitors came out to show their support and interest.

In July it was confirmed that Roto 2 of OP PALLADIUM would be led by 1 RCR. The 2 RCHA contribution would be a mortar platoon, Combat Support Company headquarters, and a transport platoon to supplement 2 Service Battalion and the NSE. The deployment date for Roto 2 is January 1998. Major Doyle, MWO Robinson, Major (WSE) McPherson, Capt Pederson and MWO Lizotte are leading our 115-man contingent.

Due to the deployment, D Battery assumed responsibility for Company HQ and the D&S Platoon of





the DART (Disaster Assistance Response Team). Originally a 1 RCR led tasking, OP GRIFFON is a quick reaction force able to deploy worldwide within 24hrs to aide in disaster relief. Major Woodgate and MWO Moretti now lead the Brigade's DART contingent.

In August, another Regimental School kicked off. The courses consisted of Driver Wheel, top candidate Gnr Barrett, Light Track, top candidate Gnr Merritt, Heavy Track, top candidate Gnr Mantha, Artillery Communications, top candidate Bdr Barnes, and FOO Tech, top candidate MBdr Smith. The Regimental School ran until 15 October and concluded with confirmation exercises.

In September, the Regiment was informed that 3 RCR had been confirmed for Roto 3 of OP PALLADIUM. The Regiment would be responsible for providing a mortar platoon, a transportation platoon, and Combat Support Company Headquarters. This put the Regimental contribution at over 100 personnel for Roto 3. The deployment is scheduled to begin in July of 1998.

October found F Battery deploying to Gagetown for two weeks on Ex EASTERN FOX to provide support to the RCAS. F Battery fired for both the Instructor In Gunnery course and the Artillery 6B course. Meanwhile D Battery put the lead in the weeds in Petawawa, firing live for the Royal Canadian Dragoons.

With the operational deployment of two Batteries over the next year, the Regiment was re-formed into Roto 3 Battery led by Captain Dave MacPherson, Firing

Battery led by Major John Woodgate, and HQ Battery remained somewhat intact led by Major Nauss. All of the Batteries have their agenda and will be extremely busy during the upcoming year.

The annual winter sports day held in December allowed the newly formed batteries to compete against each other for the first time. This forged the new teams within the newly formed sub-units. The day began with a snowy 6 km road race and went on to include ice hockey, floor hockey, broomball, basketball, and indoor soccer. Firing Battery was victorious at the end of the day but all three Batteries formed new identities in the process.

This year's Regimental Hockey Day finished with a different result from last year. The RSM Sluggers defeated the CO's Hustler's by a 3-2 score. Merry's Master Bombardiers then played Roberts' Gunner/Bombardiers and were defeated soundly. This set up the final between the Snr NCO's and the Gunner/Bombardiers. 1997 was the second year of service for 4th Air Defence Regiment, RCA following our reactivation on 21 July 1996. The reactivation was predicated upon a two-year start-up cycle consisting of one year largely dedicated to individual training, followed by one year during which the Regiment would concentrate upon subunit training to meet the operational readiness requirement by the end of the 1998 annual posting season. The 1997 calendar year therefore saw the end of the Regiment's first training year, the beginning of its second, and the transition between the two - and a busy year it was.

4th Air Defence Training and Liaison Detachment Cold Lake started the year off by providing vehicle and personnel support to Exercise ROYAL BLUE, a 2 RCR winter training exercise held in Cold Lake 15-24 Jan 97. The remainder of the Regiment busied itself running QL2 and primary combat function courses designed to qualify its personnel as trained Air Defence Gunners, and build up the necessary base of personnel trained on our weapons systems. The first half of 1997 saw, in addition to QL2 courses, the completion of a QL2 Co-op course and a variety of Driver-Wheel, Driver-Track, Basic Communicator, ADATS Gunner, 35 mm Maintainer, Skyguard Fire Control Unit Radar Maintainer, and ADATS Detachment Commander courses. By 31 December

1997, the Regiment had run or participated in 23 courses, employing 169 instructors and qualifying 364 students.

A number of personnel from the Regiment participated in Exercise STALWART WARRIOR in Kingston, Ontario from 28 Feb-6 Mar 97, and others represented the CF overseas by assisting Oerlikon Aerospace at Abu Dhabi's ARMEX on 15-21 Mar. The Regiment conducted a recce of Forward Operating Locations in the far north on 03-07 March 97 in the company of AIRCOM and NORAD personnel as part of national contingency planning. It also conducted Exercise TOP SHAPE (Regimental maintenance) from 15-21 March 97. During the same period, Det Cold Lake received the visits of the Chief of Air Staff of the Republic of Singapore (18 Mar) and of LGen Hechter, Chief of the South African Air Force (28 Apr).

The main event in April was the Regiment's participation in Ex ROVING SANDS 97 at Fort Bliss, Texas (12-26 Apr). Fort Bliss is similar to Suffield, Alberta,

but without the charm and ambiance. Vehicle trailers and generators were dispatched to Manitoba as part of Operation ASSISTANCE, the flood-control efforts on the Red River. Immediately thereafter, the Regiment participated in Exercises NIMROD GALE with the Royal Canadian Artillery School (28 Apr - 4 May); MAPLE FLAG with AIRCOM (12 May - 21 Jun) and MARCOT 1/97 with MARCOM (9 - 28 Jun). This latter exercise proved the Regiment's capability to operate jointly with all three services when an ADATS from 119 AD Bty successfully located and tracked the periscope of a US Navy LOS ANGELES-class nuclear attack submarine at a range in excess of 10 kilometres.

During the month of May the Regiment held an open house in Moncton, and participated in the AHEAD trial firing 19-26 May in Gagetown. AHEAD, or Advanced Hit Efficiency and Destruction, is a new type of ammunition for the 35 mm guns, and is time-fused by computer to burst ahead of a target and shower it with heavy-metal sub-projectiles. This gives the Gun/Skyguard section a vastly increased capability against

not only normal aerial targets, but also against air-tosurface missiles. Finally, in-house training over the summer qualified 131 soldiers through a total of six courses.

Following block leave, the Regiment returned to work with a new focus upon Troop and Battery level training. The aim was to develop, achieve and eventually prove the ability of the Regiment to meet its operational task of deploying a SHORAD Composite Air Defence Battery in support of both Brigade and Installation taskings. Det Cold Lake participated in Operation BULLDOG 2, an electronic warfare exercise conducted at CFB Cold Lake by the CFEWC/NDHQ, and also conducted a demonstration of ADATS and the 35mm Gun for a Royal Singapore Air Force delegation visiting 4 Wing on 18 Aug 97.

September began with a Regimental rendez-vous in Gagetown, during which the Commanding Officer and the staff took the opportunity to brief the Regiment on important developments in CF and Army policy. The meeting included a Regimental Run and a Regimental Parade. The Regiment provided an ADATS, 35mm Gun

and Skyguard Radar FCU as part of a military equipment display for the NATO Military Committee in Ottawa on 10-11 Sep 97. It also assisted the Air Integrated Support Station/NDHQ in an ECM trial of CARDS, an EW noise jammer mounted on a CE-144 Challenger aircraft, at CFB Gagetown on 23-24 Sep 97.

The composite battery concept was tested in October during Exercises RAGING STILETTO and TEQUILA SUNRISE at CFB Gagetown. The Exercises saw elements of 119 and 128 AD Btys deployed as a composite battery, with 119 AD Bty taking the lead on brigade manoeuvre operations in the Gagetown training area, then handing command over to 128 AD Bty in an installation role, protecting the Fredericton Airport. The exercise was a significant milestone in proving both the new operational concept and the inherent flexibility of the Regiment's soldiers. Also in October, Cpl Derek Herritt of 210 AD Wksp was awarded the Commanding Officer's Commendation for quick thinking and courageous action in extinguishing a sudden fire in one of the Regiment's LSVWs.

December saw the Regiment draw together again in Gagetown, this time to celebrate Saint Barbara's Day. The personnel of the Regiment tried their hands at a variety of sports competitions ranging from the amusing (blind volleyball) to the exhausting (snow football). Broomball and hockey were indulged in with energy, good humour and surprisingly few casualties. The evening



THE CANADIAN ARTILLERY SCHOOL

THE ARTILLERY SCHOOL YEAR IN REVIEW

As the order in council is not yet signed, the amalgamated school's name remains, The Artillery School, until official recognition of the new title, The Royal Canadian Artillery School is promulgated.

1997 proved to be a very memorable year as it held many new and unique challenges. The Artillery School participated in numerous exercises, ceremonies and social events. Training continued in full force for all Artillery and Maintenance disciplines, whether they were attending or instructing courses. Manning at the School0 consisted of 55 Officers, 101 Senior Non-commissioned Officers, and 144 Junior Non-commissioned Members for a total strength of 306 including 6 civilian employees. There are a higher number of Officers and Senior NCOs due to the number posted to the Advanced Training List who are attending training conducted at the School. The keystone courses were the Master Gunner Course, an Instructor-in-Gunnery Course (Field) and an Assistant Instructor-in-Gunnery Course (Air Defence).

Headquarters Battery

This past year, the Headquarters Battery of the Artillery School continued to provide excellent support. Standards kept particularly busy due the number of

courses run this past year. Standards also had the task of attending a number of course Training Standards and course Training Plan writing boards to ensure that all Artillery courses are properly designed. Operations Troop, Administration Section and Information Technology & Simulation held the school on an even keel. IT&S also provided technical support to the Infantry School, which suggests that the most dangerous thing on the battlefield is a highly motivated infanteer with a laptop.

Standards activities included amendments, revisions, and in some cases a total re-write of Training Plans (TP). Maintenance Standards Troop supported several taskings including most notably a tasking to PETE to provide maintenance training for their civilian technicians. They also provided a Vehicle Technician Warrant Officer for the Golan Heights for six months.

We also bade farewell to Captain Dale Arndt, who was accepted for OT to Air Navigator. After training to shoot down planes for ten years Dale finally decided to find out what it was like to be a target.

Gunnery Training Battery

Phase Training was the order of the day for the Summer period, while the Fall was a particularly busy time. A Field Troop Commanders course, Advance

Luc Frennette, Ron MacEachern, Lawrence Dufour and Scotty Morrison to attend the Advanced Jedi Knight Course (Junior Staff College Course) at Kingston.

Locating Tp provided countless PLGR GPS training courses. Support was provided to Summer Phase training, ARCON, and the IG, Adv Tech, the Fd TSM and FOO course. This level of training essentially resulted in the troop being deployed from June to December.

Ammo and Equipment worked on a variety of trials for various computing devices to be used in the interim for the LG1 and C3. 2 RCHA's F Bty did field tests on one of the proposed models and their results are under review and development. A trial was conducted on the 35 mm AHEAD ammunition, and a modification to the Power Supply Unit Mount on the 35 mm Gun was developed to alleviate some of the weight problems encountered. In cooperation with Survey Tp, trials were conducted on sound ranging equipment and GPS.

Maintenance Battery

Maintenance Bty continued to provide top-notch instruction on the maintenance of LLAD and land based radar equipment. During this year a total of 60 EME and CELE students were trained on the 11 courses that were offered. One noteworthy milestone that was reached in



the year was the first ever CF- run ADATS EM maintenance crse. The Bty found time for some relaxation time as well with adventure training in Fundy National Park. The Bty took part in the Labatt 24 hr Relay as the "Lode-runners." W Battery

A Driver Wheeled, Driver Light Track, 35mm Gun and ADATS Operator courses were organized and run by the troop, for the troop. A fine effort was demonstrated by both the instructors, drawn from the Troop and the newly arrived gunners, who felt like professional students having spent almost 7 months in continuous training since enrolling in the CF.

Headquarters Troop was the glue that bound W Battery together. The Motor Transport Section and drivers pool, consisting of 22 all ranks kept all 120 vehicles on the road in support of all school activities while the QM

MESSAGE FROM THE SENIOR RESERVE GUNNER

It is a pleasure to have an opportunity to address a few words to the members of the Canadian Gunner family. Since my appointment as Chief of Reserves and Cadets in September, 1997, I have particularly enjoyed the many occasions when I have once again been in the company of Gunners.

After a three year sojourn on the Supplementary List, my reintroduction to the Canadian Forces has certainly been both interesting and challenging, and has served also to remind me of the tremendous dedication, commitment and professionalism of our Reservists and Regulars. We all face the same challenges; budget and funding, a climate of change and renewal, adaptation to changing requirements and the fundamental need to provide effective individual and collective training within an environment of constrained resources. Army Reserve units have also been concurrently undergoing evaluation as part of the Land Force Reserve Restructure (LFRR) process. It is in meeting all of these challenges that I have been most impressed by the quality of our Canadian Forces men and women.

During the 1998 ice storms, as well as in a variety of peace support operations abroad, the Gunners of Canada have contributed significantly to the enhanced public profile of the Canadian Forces. My personal thanks and congratulations go to all of you who participated in these activities and to those who served in units, headquarters and bases in order to ensure that the deployed personnel were fully supported and sustained. Of the 16,000 CF personnel who served in the ice damaged areas of Canada, over 4,000 were Reservists who willingly and promptly made themselves available for full-time service. This "surge capability" is a core function of our Reserve units and one that must be maintained as part of the Reserve Restructure.

In late 1999 the Army Reserve will begin to undergo significant changes, as the NDHQ staff, areas, brigades and units move to implement the early stages of the Land Force Reserve Restructure. These changes are in response to the many strategic, operational, organizational and financial factors that continue to

11TH FIELD REGIMENT ROYAL CANADIAN ARTILLERY

As usual, the past year has been very active for 11 Fd Regt. We started at a fast pace and really never slowed down throughout the year. On 7 March 1997, 22 soldiers deployed to Camp Blanding, Florida as part of A Bty for Exercise Southern Drive. Before departing, 11 Fd Regt had already been on two 3-day gun exercises in January and February. Many of our personnel held key appointments on this exercise, and a great deal of time was devoted to Ex Southern Drive. The exercise in Florida was over for only one day when, on 18 March, we sent several soldiers to Fort Knox, Kentucky on Exercise Steel Fist. Maintaining our operational tempo, a three day gun exercise was conducted in each of April and May, with the exercise in May also being the Regimental Family Day.

Summer saw the graduation of our unit-run QL2 Co-op course, and QL4 Arty Comms course. We were also involved in the confirmation trials for the CF generation II fragmentation protective vest, which included compatibility trials with future CF personal protective clothing and equipment. In Aug, one BC party and two FOO parties were sent on Trillium Sceptre.

In the fall, Warrior training began in earnest. Before long we were once again involved in artillery training, and participated in a 3-day exercise at Fort Drum, New York in Nov. This was followed by another 3-day

gun exercise at Meaford, where key positions in the Fd Bty were evaluated. November was an important month for two other reasons. On 30 November, the Colonel Commandant visited Guelph to present Mr Arthur Lee with a print from the original plate used in the printing of the famous poem "In Flanders Fields" by John McCrae. Arthur Lee was in Guelph to donate the McCrae medals (which he purchased at an auction) to the McCrae House. Also, LCol Tootell was confirmed as our Honorary Lieutenant-Colonel. Col Erskine continues to serve in the position of Honorary Colonel.

At our Regimental Christmas Dinner, the annual Centennial Awards were announced and awarded to: Best FOO – Capt Pickering; Best Junior Officer – Lt Vamos; Best Senior NCO - Sgt Tischhausser; Best Junior NCO – MCpl Turner; and Best Bty – 11 Bty. In addition, the Guelph Artillery Support Group presented two \$500 bursaries to Bdr Gobin and Gnr Schubert to assist them in their academic studies. Likewise, the Hamilton Artillery Association also presented \$500 bursaries to Bdr Bailey and Bdr Tearle.

Other significant events that took place this past year included the deployment of one officer and one soldier on OP Palladium and two soldiers on OP Assistance. Of particular note, 11 Fd Regt contributed 61 personnel for OP Recuperation. This was one of the



largest contingents of any of the reserve units in 31 CBG. This figure does not include the many soldiers who assisted the deployment by working extra hours in Guelph.

With the onset of summer, the unit dispatched a




Bdr William Martinez decends the high wall during a rappelling exercise as part of Warrior Training 1997.





This past year has been a period of great change for 20th Field Regiment. 

30TH FIELD REGIMENT ROYAL CANADIAN ARTILLERY

30th Fd Regt RCA has continued to maintain its sharp edge. In January 1997, the FOO and BC parties trained for one weekend on 2 RCHA's indirect fire simulator. That same weekend, the guns practiced dry deployments at Uplands air base. The following week, the officers and NCOs attended a professional development lecture given by Major General R. Dallaire. Major General Dallaire's presentation addressed his experiences in Rwanda, and his estimation of what lies ahead for the Canadian Forces.

In February 1997 two of our soldiers trained with 2 RCHA for over two weeks in the Arctic. A separate training exercise in February was hampered by unrelenting freezing rain, which resulted in the Petawawa ranges being closed.

Early in March, we sent a gun detachment, command post party, and FOO party to participate on Ex Southern Drive in Florida. A composite battery made up from the five Ontario artillery regiments provided support to a composite infantry battalion for two weeks. During the second weekend in March, the NCOs conducted professional development training in Quebec City. Later in March, the firing battery conducted a live fire exercise in Petawawa. The battery was informally evaluated by 2 RCHA because Brigade HQ decided to evaluate all militia units every two years vice annually.

It is with honour and pride that 30th Fd sent ten soldiers to participate on Operation Assistance, the Manitoba flood fighting mission. These dedicated and patriotic soldiers, on 24 hours notice, departed with 120 other soldiers from 33 Brigade. Many others volunteered from 30th Fd, but only ten were tasked out by brigade. This participation was a great way to show Canadians one of the benefits to retaining a large Reserve force.

In addition to this operation, during the spring period 30th Fd saw the fruition of its planning of two dynamic training opportunities. The first was the participation of six gunners in the United Kingdom with 289 Commando Battery (289 Cdo). These gunners, led by MWO S. Nadeau, participated on 289 Cdo summer gun camp and visited several military and historical sights. All the soldiers returned feeling "great" about the training opportunities and hospitality they received. This regiment also took along a gunner from 5th Fd Regt RCA in British Columbia to spread the training opportunities among the gunner family.

In May WO W. Vyse led an adventure training exercise to the Yukon. Using Whitehorse Cadet Camp (run by artillery Maj R. Jarret) as a base, , six 30th Fd and two 289 Cdo gunners paddled for days by canoe along a former gold miner route on Big Salmon River, 300 km north east of Whitehorse. Their timing was bang on as the




bugs had not yet begun to bite and the ice had just thawed. For some reason their collective expertise in fishing and gold panning did not produce any results!

The Fall was very busy for the gunners and soldiers of 30th Fd. The provision of four Leopard tanks to our first weekend exercise in September added realism to our combined arms training. Although the armoured participation was limited to two hours, the briefing and rides we received proved interesting. For the remainder of the weekend the regiment rotated its gun detachments through various test stands. Gunners were questioned on fire discipline, and detachments put through their paces on specialized tasks, such as sniping guns. The final marks for all were very close but in the end it was MBdr G. Duffy and his gun crew that were the best, winning the CO's Pennant.

Another special event in September was one exercise where about 90 family members and employers were taken to the training area where they observed the regiment in action. The family/employers day tour included witnessing impacting artillery shells, seeing live fire from the guns, walking through a tactical defensive display, firing machine guns, and eating army rations. The weather was excellent, capping off a good public relations day.

In early Fall the regiment sent its soldiers to participate in combined arms training with the infantry and armour: FOO parties trained with the Governor General's Foot Guards (GGFG) in Petawawa, the Princess of Wales Own Regiment (PWOR) south of Kingston; and the Governor General's Horse Guards (GGHG) in Meaford. Also, 19 officers and senior NCOs participated in professional development training in Atlantic Canada. We also qualified most of the regiment's members in basic soldiering as part of the annual Individual Battle Task Standards (IBTS) qualification. This included live grenade tossing, M72 sub-calibre shoots, and rifle marksmanship.

In late Fall, as a professional development event for the officers, Honorary Lieutenant Colonel E. C. Scott lectured on his Second World War experiences. His stories were extremely interesting, and the officers much appreciated the opportunity to receive personal insight





18TH AIR DEFENCE REGIMENT ROYAL CANADIAN ARTILLERY

1997 was a year full of activity including a Change of Command for the Regiment and the retirement of LCol S.E.I. Steinke. Major J.C.P. Jourdeuil assumed the duties of Commanding Officer.

This summer proved to be a challenging and valuable learning experience due to the fact that the Regiment conducted its own QL2 and QL3 Courses. Not only was this a construction from the ground up but the unit still fulfilled its commitment to the taskings assigned by 41 CBG Calgary. With all the activity at the Regiment, its commitment to scheduled unit exercises remains a high priority.

The Armouries was undergoing renovations to the trainer facility. Completion of this project is scheduled for end March 1998. Our regular force strength is 38 and the reserve force is approximately 67, a total of 115 members.

EXERCISES

The last year has been a busy one for the Regiment. As with all 41 CBG units, 18th AD Regt was busy with the conduct of annual Warrior training in the early part of the year. This training was conducted in two serials of EXERCISE QUICK SHOT in CFB Suffield.

The traditional, sometimes uncomfortable, changing of the tunics during the Men's Christmas Dinner. MCpl Bob Dulan becomes RSM and Pte Bains becomes CO.

The shoots went well, with all pers qualifying...eventually in some cases. The major activity for the later part of 1997 was EXERCISE MARCOT, an unopposed company landing into the harbour at Nanoose. In support of this exercise, one Troop of five detachments was deployed to the vessels USS Anchorage, HMCS Nanimo and HMCS Edmonton.

The unit has also been working very closely with 1 CMBG over the last year. Col Leslie, Comd 1 CMBG, has made it Brigade policy that all exercises, coy level and above, will be combined arms. Subsequently this unit has enjoyed constant requests for the provision of personnel in JANUS Comd & Control Exercises, as well as many FTXs. Unfortunately the Brigade support to Operation RECUPERATION prevented the planned participation in EXERCISE QUICK STRIKE, the airmobile and airborne exercise with 3rd Bn PPCLI, but many other opportunities remain.

18TH AD REGT DEPLOYS TO MARCOT 2/97

Twenty personnel from the Regiment along with a JFACC cell can now say they have been to sea as part of the Maritime Co-ordinated Operations Training (MARCOT) Exercise 2/97. This event featured combined

operations involving ground, sea and air forces from five countries: Canada, United States, Chile, United Kingdom and Australia.

The mission of this MARCOT was two-fold: enforce an UN embargo preventing arms from entering the fictional Third World nation of Vanis, and establish a safe harbour to allow shipment of humanitarian relief to Vanis after years of a bitter civil war. Our troop was part of the task force establishing the safe harbour. We were tasked to provide air defence for High Value Assets while in transit in the Straits of Juan de Fuca and Georgia and to provide air defence for the safe harbour. Once ashore, the troop worked in concert with the infantry in several heliborne deployments to strategically located islands around the safe harbour.

The troop departed Lethbridge the morning of 14 Oct 97 aboard a CF Hercules transport aircraft. Our first full day began with the customary liquid sunshine so common on the West Coast. This pre-sail phase was an opportunity to liaise with the navy commanders and to begin integrating our command and control structure with that of the ships. This pre-sail time was also used to establish sites on each of the MCDVs and USS Anchorage for positioning of the javelin detachments. A command and control exercise sorted out the bugs and a workable system was put in place where positive control would be exercised over all detachments from the USS Anchorage's Combat Information Centre (CIC). Monday the 20th was spent by the majority of the troop aboard HMCS Edmonton testing the SOPs in a live aircraft ADEX in the Strait of Juan de Fuca. Meanwhile, back at Esquimalt the TSM supervised the loading of our vehicles aboard the USS Anchorage and the Tp Comd attended meetings and briefs.

The USS Anchorage and HMCS Edmonton sailed from Esquimalt bound for Nanoose on October 21st up the Strait of Georgia. Along the way both ships conducted live AD exercises and having worked out the bugs the troops were anxious to debark and reach terra firma again. When it became obvious that UN air superiority over the safe harbour made our presence unnecessary, we received orders to deploy to Nirvana Airfield (a.k.a. CFB Comox) to augment the airfield's air defence. It was a welcome return to operating as one integral unit after spending nearly two weeks with the detachments spread around and under tactical control of others. On Oct 30th End-Ex was given and we deployed back to Victoria, and subsequently, Lethbridge.

Without exception, all were glad to be back home and each should be commended for a job well done. MARCOT 97 represented the culmination of many days of planning and training. Many thanks are also due to the spouses and families for their support of our soldiers while they are away from home.

OPUS WARRIOR

Exercise OPUS WARRIOR 97 was held on the 12th April 1997 in the local area. As with last year the course was laid out to challenge all participants to their



with their name. The first team from B Troop took first place, Support Troop took second place and the second team from B Troop took third place.

RECRUITMENT AND COURSES

1997 was a busy year for recruiting and courses. Capts Jeff Schamehorn and Lorne Plemel and Sgt Paul Fowler were the Regimental recruiters. They did an excellent job, resulting in approx 50 recruits being enrolled. 30 of these eventually completed QL2 and 11 went on to the QL3 AD crse. Everyone was kept busy with Wednesday night open house activities, walk in applicants and scouting for potential recruits in the high schools, post secondary institutions, and setting up displays at local malls, career fairs, and events such as the local air show. This year we hope to attract and recruit approx 100 applicants who will eventually become gunners with the Regiment.

The Regiment was again tasked to provide a number of instructors and general duty personnel for various courses across Canada. In addition, we conducted phase one of the QL3 Basic Javelin course, which graduated 8 gunners, a driver wheel course, which


HISTORICAL AND COMMUNITY ACTIVITY

The Regiment is active in numerous activities in the immediate community and surrounding areas. Highlights were the Freedom Of The City of Lethbridge, Calgary Stampede, March For Kids and the New Years Levee.

The weekend of 23-24 May the Regiment was awarded the Freedom of The City of Lethbridge. This honour had previously been awarded to 18th Field Regiment in 1966 but to be safe the honour was given to 18th Air Defence Regiment. 

This past year was one of transition for the instructor cadre in Shilo. The Royal Canadian Artillery (RCA) Battle School marked its de-activation with a parade June 28th, 1997, reducing its establishment from 43 to 19 all ranks. In the process, The Royal Regiment lost one unit, one Commanding Officer and one CWO/RSM position.

The RCA Band provided musical accompaniement for the parade. One of the highlights of the parade was the presentation to The Royal


Regiment of Canadian Artillery of a replica of the King's Banner by members of the RCA Battle School.

In recent years, the RCA Battle School has been tasked to instruct on far more courses than originally envisioned. The vast majority of this responsibility has been toward Reserve training. All told almost 6,500 students and 3,000 augmentee soldiers and instructors passed through the School in its 16 years of operation.

During the parade, LCol Ron Curry, who served as the School CO for four years, and CWO Arnold Furber, who served twice as School RSM, marched off the School for the last time. Major Paul Heenan, Detachment Commander of the Western Area Training Centre, Artillery Detachment Shilo, and his Company Sergeant Major, Master Warrant Officer Jim Sandul, marched on the detachment for the first time. As a result of the restructure of the Land Force Individual Training System, the RCA Battle School, the Princess Patricia's Canadian Light Infantry Battle School and CFB Wainwright were amalgamated on 01 April to form the Western Area Training Centre (WATC). Commanded by LCol D. MacLean and headquartered in Wainwright, Alberta, WATC is now responsible for various courses for both

the Regular and Reserve Force that comprise LFWA.

WATC will provide the Militia Training and Support function for LFWA. This entails observing Reserve units while they are on exercise and providing advance feedback on their training to meet certain Battle Task Standards. WATC will be a smaller and more efficient organization that will accomplish the training mandate of Commander LFWA. WATC Artillery Detachment Shilo will be an integral part of this organization, and will be primarily concerned with artillery training within LFWA.

With all of this in mind, it might be easier to tell you which Gunners are left in the training cadre in Shilo. Besides the OC and CSM, Capts Mike Locke and John Munkittrick remained as Training Troop Commander and Support Troop Commander, respectively, and are double-hatted as MTSC team leaders as well. Other positions were filled during the year by personnel who left us on promotion specifically, MWOs John Stone (for LFAA HQ in Halifax and he was replaced by WO Randy Sedgwick), Malcolm Angus (now BSM B) and Dan McKinnon.

The Artillery Detachment Shilo was busy with

its last QL3 Air Defence Course graduating on 27 June 1997 and the Artillery National and Area Course schedule, which saw artillery students, from across Canada, attend qualification courses. The summer period saw more that 150 students attend courses. In total, the student intake for 1997 was 288 with an overall success rate of 86%.

WATC ADS had no students in house from September 1997 until 5 January 1998, which allowed for a restructuring and realigning of staff and tasks. It is not all work and no play at WATC ADS, as staff took part in two "Partnerschaft Fun Days". On September 24th, the WATC ADS sent forth a six-man team to a navigation and endurance exercise organized by the German Army Training Establishment Shilo (GATES). Oberfeldwebel Fisher described our second partnershaft event as being a "Fun Shoot". It was scheduled to take place at Elk View Range on September 30th, with the number of Canadian soldiers taking part in this activity increasing to 22.

After completing the Fun Shoot, our hosts invited everyone back to the Tenne Club (all ranks mess) where we continued the festivities. A renewal of the Partnershaft (twinning), which was originally formed on 31 May 1996, took place when scrolls were exchanged between Oberstleutnant Marquard (CO of GATES) and Major Heenan (OC of WATC ADS).

As the year winds down, all members of WATC ADS look forward to January 1998 and the arrival of students for two QL3 (Fd) courses. This will return the instructional cadre to its primary raison d'etre, producing new gunners for primarily 1 RCHA and The Royal Regiment as a whole.




GUNNERS IN BOSNIA - OP PALLADIUM ROTO 1



1 RCHA FSCC - LdSH (RC) BG



and we even manipulated our Brit gunner pals. We had a Brit Artillery LO team with us from 40 Regt which allowed us to "talk" with AS-90s – the only guns in the Multi-National Division - into letting us play along with them from time to time.

The FOO/FAC teams had a good time. G31 was based out of Camp Holopina and G32 was in Zgon. Between the two teams they were able to rack up some 470 aircraft controls during some 135 TOTs - not bad at all. We also deployed on a live fire ex with the Brits, and assisted as Liaison Officers during two elections. On top of that the suntans stayed even, the odd professional development seminar (swan) in Sarajevo and Italy was enjoyed, and no noticeable stress lines were developed. Captain Scott Hoffman, who earned the nickname "Gold Kurn monster" because of his striking resemblance to a creature on a German cereal box, became somewhat native but managed to drag himself back to reality in time for redeployment. Bombardier Brian "The Swede" Kooistra from G31 received a personal thank you from Major Ellis, the Battle Group 2IC and money man, for his outstanding support of the camp kit shop. Major Ellis had a hard time keeping the place stocked with knives but didn't mind, as this proved to be profitable for the LdSH (RC).

All in all a good tour! A lot was learned and lots of laughs were had by all. More importantly a concrete and pertinent contribution to a better life for the people of this battered land was achieved and a true sense of satisfaction realized.

1 RCHA MORTAR TROOP - LdSH (RC) BG

The receipt of the warning order confirmed it for all. 1 RCHA was going to provide a small contingent of soldiers to deploy with the LdSH (RC) BG on Op Palladium Roto 1. Part of this contingent included a thirtynine man Mortar Troop. The Commanding Officer provided direction and the Troop quickly formed. Soldiers from C Bty provided the nucleus of the Troop, however, all Batteries within the Regiment provided soldiers to fill



its ranks.

Though the tour itself was only six months long, there was a lot of activity which had to happen prior to the actual deployment. It was February and characteristically cold for Shilo, but that didn't hinder the completion of four courses the soldiers had to complete. There were two serials of AVGP/BISON and both a Basic and an Advanced Mortar course to be run. As usual, all soldiers quickly assimilated their new skills and demonstrated (being the masters of indirect fire!) that the mortar was just another weapon designed to do what they already knew how to do. The Infantry School was invited to send their Mortar SME to the Regiment to monitor the progress of the Advanced Mortar course. He was extremely impressed with the skills of the soldiers and just how well, and in such a short time, they mastered the material. The pre-deployment training drew to a close with the completion of exercise Resolute Gunner, a five day Regimental live fire exercise, followed by a week of pairs, section then platoon level quick attack ranges.

The Winnipeg Floods came and went and the Battle Group deployed back to CFB Wainwright to finish its training. The soldiers in the Troops performed to an excellent standard. Our counter parts in the infantry were particularly impressed with our performance on the live fire platoon attack ranges. Some commented that the drive, skill and aggressiveness demonstrated by the soldiers within the Troop were better that a lot of their infantry friends. This was not a surprise to us, but the professional debate comparing each other's skills is something that will always exist. The training ended in Wainwright and the Troop deployed back to CFB Shilo to begin its period of leave before departure to Bosnia-Herzegovina.

The first flight to Edmonton left on 29 July and the last flight arrived in theater on 17 August 97. The first thing the soldiers noticed is that it was very hot and that the drivers in this country (Bosnians) drove very aggressively. Upon completing the hand over the first task given to the Troop by the CO was to familiarize us

with the Battle Group AOR.

The Troop's mission was to act as the Battle Group's integral indirect fire asset, but its secondary role (read most of the time) was to be the Battle Group reserve, more commonly referred to as the QRF. Our duties in theater encompassed many things. We did everything that the other sub-units were expected to do. This included patrols, both vehicular and foot, observation tasks, camp security, cantonment site inspections, convoy/VIP escort and protection and establishing road blocks and checkpoints when necessary, to mention but a few. In short, there was nothing that the Troop was not involved in.

The Troop also conducted seven mortar live fire gun camps, four of which involved cross training with other Battle Groups within the Multi-National Division. More specifically, the Troop had the opportunity to exercise with British, Dutch, Czech, American and Malaysian forces. The experiences were invaluable and on every occasion the performance of the soldiers was noted by their counter parts to be very professional and of the highest of standard.

On 10 January 98, the LdSH (RC) Battle Group gave way to the 1 RCR Battle Group. The tour for all soldiers was interesting, challenging and professionally rewarding. Mortar Troop distinguished itself as an organization of first class soldiers. Every soldier left the theater of operations with his own unique experiences and accomplishments, but all had that same sense of pride in a job very well done.

THE LIAISON CELL GUNNERS

1997 offered the chance for several gunners to participate in OP Palladium in Bosnia -Herzegovina. OP Palladium Roto 1 found three members of 1 RCHA attached to the Liaison Officer Cell of the Lord Strathcona's Horse (Royal Canadian) Battle Group. Captain Shawn Fortin worked as Liaison Officer Operations within the Battle Group Headquarters at Camp Holopina, Coralici. Bombardier Ken Hutcheson worked as an Iltis driver for the Canadian International


Development Agency (CIDA) Project Officer also based at Camp Holopina. Captain Simon Champken, 1 RCHA's British Exchange Officer, worked as Liaison Officer Zgon, based at Camp Maple Leaf, Zgon.

The Liaison Officer Cell is responsible for coordination between the numerous International Organizations (IOs) and Non-Governmental Organizations (NGOs) working within our area of operations, as well as liaison with the adjacent Battle Group. In addition, a large portion of our time was spent locating, developing and contracting for Humanitarian Aid projects. These projects included rebuilding of schools, medical clinics, and small businesses to name but a few. Furthermore, the Liaison Cell coordinated the distribution of Humanitarian Aid items such as clothes, food, toys, blankets, etc that went out to the local populous via subunits working out of all CCSFOR camps.

Our work proved at times to be very interesting especially during the Municipal Elections and the Republic of Srpska (RS) National Assembly Elections. Captain (who says only two beers?) Champken spent several days working out of Sanski Most (conveniently located near his old British Artillery Unit). Bombardier (don't touch that computer!) Hutcheson probably put more kilometers on his Iltis than he cares to remember. And Captain (hold down the office again) Fortin kept in phone contact, while keeping his computer up to date on the daily happenings. Nevertheless, a meaningful tour was had by all within the Liaison Cell.

CONCLUDING WORDS FROM COL CAPSTICK

To conclude on a more serious note, Op PALLADIUM Roto 1 was a very successful mission that again demonstrated the outstanding professionalism of the Canadian soldier. As a Gunner, I could not have been more pleased by the performance of all members of The Royal Regiment in theatre. This includes people like Maj Mike Mussolum (former BC H, 3 RCHA) and Capt Simon Heatherington of the 1st Regiment who were key staff officers in the British Divisional HQ as well as Maj Brian Douglas (of the Artillery School) who worked




