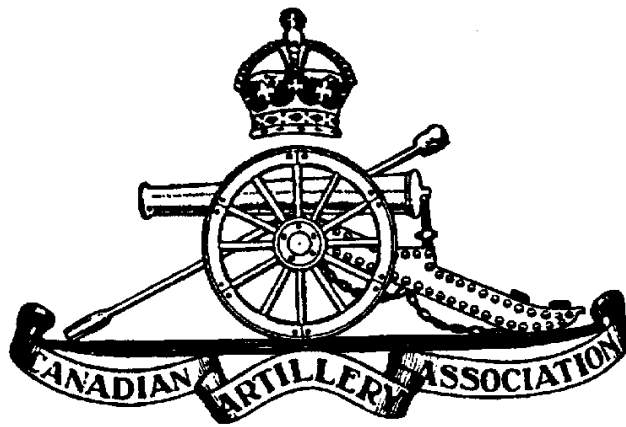

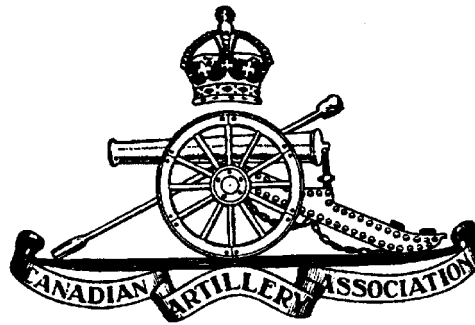

Lieutenant-Colonel Clyde E. Healey, CD

Lieutenant-Colonel Healey was born in Sault Ste Marie, ON in 1946. His post secondary education includes a Bachelor of Arts degree from Lake Superior State University, an Ontario Teaching Certificate from North Bay Teachers' College, Certification in Personnel Management (CHRP) from the Personnel Association of Ontario and training in Emergency Preparedness from the Emergency Preparedness College in Arnprior, Ontario..

Lieutenant-Colonel Healey joined the 49th (Sault Ste Marie) Field Regiment in 1967 after having completed five years with the Royal Canadian Air Cadets, 155 Squadron and two years as an officer with Navy League of Canada. He progressed with his training and development as an Artillery Officer for the next few years, as he completed his post secondary education. He was promoted Major in 1976 and attended the Militia Command and Staff course in 1977. He commanded 148 Battery and 30-Battery, the tasked gun battery.

In 1970 Lieutenant-Colonel Healey commanded a detachment of 20 military personnel at Operation Big Dig. This archeological dig and youth hostel operated for five months at Wawa, ON as a joint operation between the Military and Lakehead University. In 1972, while attending Teacher's College, he was seconded to Northern Ontario Militia District Headquarters for one year. He later returned to the Headquarters in 1991-93 to become G3 (Operations Training) and later Deputy Commander.

In 1980, Lieutenant-Colonel Healey was appointed Commanding Officer of the 49th (Sault Ste Marie) Field Regiment, which he commanded until 1984. In 1980, the Honourable John Black Aird, Lieutenant Governor of Ontario appointed him Aide de camp and he went on to serve The Honourable Lincoln M. Alexander, in the same capacity. He was posted to Supplementary list from 1984 until 1991, when he was taken on strength of Northern Ontario District.

In 1993 he was again appointed Commanding Officer of the Regiment until his retirement in 1999. During the Ice Storm of 1998 he acted in the capacity of Liaison Officer between 2CMBG, Ontario Hydro and Bell Canada, during the recovery operations

Lieutenant-Colonel Healey has an extensive list of volunteer organizations that he has worked with over the years, including the Victorian Order of Nurses, Industrial Accident Prevention Association, Sault Amateur Soccer Association, Sault College program Advisory Board and is a Member of the Regimental Senate. Lieutenant-Colonel Healey was recognized in 2004 as the Volunteer of the Year for the Industrial Accident Prevention Association.

Lieutenant-Colonel Healey joined his current employer in 1990, after 17 years with the Board of Education. PUC Services Inc. is a local utilities company that distributes electricity, water, wastewater and telecommunication. He is the Vice president of Corporate Services. He and his wife, Gunta, have three daughters; Laura a human resource specialist, Jennifer a Chef and Katrina who is attending post secondary education.

Lieutenant-Colonel Healey is proud to have been elected to the position of President of The Royal Canadian Artillery Association in September 2003 and to have served your interest for the past year.

PROCEEDINGS

The Annual General Meeting of the Royal Canadian Artillery Association commenced with the reading of the Last Post by LCol Donald G. Hamilton, Secretary. It was followed by a Moment of Silence.

The Association was welcomed by the Commander Home Station, LCol Tom Doucette, CD.

President's Opening Address – LCol Clyde E. Healey, CD

Colonel Commandant, Generals MacDonald and Salmon, Director of Artillery, members of the Royal Canadian Artillery Association. First, let me extend our thanks to LCol Tom Doucette, for inviting the Association to meet at CFB Shilo for our 128th Annual Meeting. I would also like to express our appreciation to the staff of RHQ RCA, in particular, Major Marc George and Captain Trevor Michelson, for their assistance in making the arrangements for our stay at the Home Station.

Going through the process of confirming the plan and putting the plan into effect, suffice to say, acceptance of Change was necessary. With the recent reception of the Second Battalion Princess Patricia's, conditions changed on an ongoing basis. The need to support the Patricia's meant that the Association would need to be flexible.

When we last met in Victoria, LCol Phil introduced us to "Artillery 2020" and the changing landscape that was evolving with our US counterparts, in there organization, equipments and procedures, all viewed from their recent experiences. *"Lesson Learned", if you will*, were being used to drive change or transformation. This year we want to look at the transformation that is seen as directing our future.

We will hear from speakers from SNC Tech on the next generation of munitions. How munitions will extend our reach and ability to influence the outcome. The changes for the next century will be as significant as from the last century when gunpowder lifted the range of the cannon to out pass and reach the bow and arrow. The crossbow and long bow extended the reach of the arrow and the penetration, but gun powder changed the equipment,, manning and deployment.

If you have had the opportunity to read the Spring 2004 issue of Quadrant, you will have noted the comments of D Arty:

"the new strategic environment and increased emphasis on operations in built up areas means the Artillery must develop a greater focus on precision and speed."

The transformation to meet this need will mean different equipment, different ammunitions, different tactics, different training and a new and different approach to meeting the need.

The transformation that we have embarked upon will be at least as significant, and maybe, more significant than anything we have witnessed in our own careers. Tomorrow will be so different from yesterday and today will be a time warp to get there.

Our ability to observe further out, through the use of unmanned aerial vehicles (UAV), along with our new generation of munitions, will deliver projectile out to double the present range and well beyond. The ability to reach out and touch our enemy will give new meaning to "Depth Battle." The enemy will be unable to effectively muster, when his command and control headquarters, up to 100km behind the lines, have already been identified and destroyed.

Our focus must be on the transformation, not the restoration of yesterday's ideals and ways of doing things.

Although the Artillery is organized into Regiments, a Gunner's loyalty and history is formed in his Battery. The guns, whichever platform we have used, represent the Colours of the Artillery. The Battery is where our history is gathered.

We are gathered here for our 126th Annual at N118, a place where our yesterday is recorded forever and tonight we will view the Commonwealth Air Training Plan Museums another yesterday recording. Later this evening, we will visit with 26Fd.Regt. Our today, our Conference, however, is devoted to our tomorrow.

I want to express our appreciation to SNC Tech for their support of our Annual Meeting. To my executive Committee, my thanks and appreciation for your guidance input and support. It is much appreciated.

Address by Colonel Commandant –

Major General John A. MacInnis, CMM MSC CD

Artillery Transformation

Fellow Gunners

Let me begin by recalling the tremendous success of last year's meeting which was held in Victoria and to express my hope that this meeting proves to be equally fruitful.

At this point, it has been the custom for the Colonel Commandant to give an overview of his activities over the past year. I do not intend to do that. What ZI will do is to express my views on the central topic of this meeting which is "Artillery Transformation". I applaud the Director of Artillery for suggesting this important subject at this time.

Some of you may ask why I as Colonel Commandant would address this topic when my mandate is essentially to ensure that our important and cherished ties with the past are not forgotten. It is precisely for this reason that I chose to do so. It is only by linking the past through the complexities of the present to an unknown future that any transformation makes sense. Besides, as some of you know, I remain engaged internationally in related activities.

I first want to emphasise that I totally support the army's attempt to transform itself. I have had private discussions with the acting CLS and two of the four Area Commanders and I came away convinced that the army is in good hands. I believe that the fundamental approach being taken, while not without significant risk, is basically sound. However as we all know the devil is in the details and that is where we must be vigilant to ensure that the consequences of our actions are fully appreciated. This is not an area in which we and the international community have had much success since the end of the cold war.

Canada of course is not the only country which is trying to rejig its security structures in an effort to cope with a new and complex environment. We witness the struggles occurring within the United States almost on a daily basis. During my work with the 1st German/Netherlands Corps last week, I was briefed on the subject of NATO Transformation. Similarly, both German and UK forces are in the throes of change. The German army will likely lose 30,000 positions and probably face a constitutional challenge to conscription, while the UK army is about to lose several infantry battalions. In many of these cases, the word “transformation” is a euphemism for slash and burn reductions – a much more palatable word to politicians. Clearly, based upon our own experiences over the past 15 years, there is danger here for us - although the signals being sent indicate the opposite. We remain hopeful.

At the risk of stating the obvious, artillery transformation must take place within the framework of army transformation which in turn must have some relation to the perceived and emerging strategic environment. With respect to this last linkage, there is a tendency to latch on to trite phrases which seem to sum up in a few words the precise concepts that we seek. Some of these make sense, some should never have been uttered. Let me give you my impression of several which are in common use.

The first is the so-called Three Block War

“In one moment in time, our service members will be feeding and clothing displaced refugees, providing humanitarian assistance. In the next moment, they will be holding two warring tribes apart - conducting peacekeeping operations - and, finally, they will be fighting a highly lethal mid-intensity battle - all on the same day... all within three city blocks. “

October 10, 1997, General Krulak USMC Commandant

In Canada, we have long known that soldiers have to be able to do all three and it is a fact that this revelation came late to the US military. But Gen. Krulak’s statement and the outcome of the debate which followed present some difficulties as follows:

First, it implies three separate and delinked compartments to what is probably a unified conflict situation. This presents to politicians the perception that they can pick and choose in which compartment their forces are to be involved. Under the three block war scenario, therefore it would seem perfectly logical to form and train a peacekeeping brigade to fit into the second and of course the third compartment, while avoiding the need to get involved in the messy part. This is precisely what happened with the aborted Zaire mission in 1996 when donors were willing to give aid but not willing send troops.

Secondly, it implies that the delivery of humanitarian assistance is a basic military function. It is not nor should it be. It also means a dumbing down of humanitarianism to aid delivery, ignoring humanitarian principles and the important legal aspects of protection provided for under international law. As you know, Médecins Sans Frontières (MSF) withdrew from Afghanistan in early August of this year after 24 years. One of the reasons given was that the military had co-opted humanitarian aid for political purposes. Reportedly, there have been instances when aid delivery has been tied to good behaviour. Separately, it has been alleged that individual US soldiers had been dressing in civilian clothes and handing out humanitarian aid. The statement on the following slide seems to support the allegations made by MSF.

“Relief aid is a military tool to achieve military ends and the humanitarian side of it is a positive by-product”

Canadian Major in Kabul as reported in the *Globe and Mail*

Thirdly, it also implies that the military can discriminate as a combatant, be impartial as a non-combatant and be neutral as a humanitarian should be, all within the same space and at the same time. The mind boggles.

For these reasons, the phrase “three block war” should be erased from our lexicon.

To be fair, it is true that today’s soldier must be trained and equipped to do all three and to know the difference among each of them. That in itself is a legitimate goal in the transformation process.

The next phrase that you will have heard is “Win the War and Win the Peace”. Now this one makes more sense and is an outcome of the post-9/11 reality. Unfortunately, Senator Kerry used this phrase recently; although I did hear the acting CLS use it previous to that. I draw your attention to this next slide which represents a simplified transition table from the time of classical peacekeeping. The age of terrorism which defines the current strategic environment demands that nations, alliances and coalitions have ability from the start to win the war and to win the peace. The end to organized combat must be followed immediately with a concerted effort to win the peace which included establishing political authority whose legitimacy has universal consensus. But action cannot stop there. The peace must be built up through the establishment of those institutions necessary for a complete return to normality. Following this phase, traditional peacekeeping mechanisms may have to be in place for some time.

It is imperative that military forces have the ability to participate effectively in all four phases. Achieving this capacity should be the essence of army transformation including artillery transformation.

The third phrase is Plug and Play. In a recent newspaper article, Lou MacKenzie pointed to the frustration experienced by the CO of 1PPCLI who deplored the fact that the basic plug and play element of the infantry was a company-sized grouping of about 100 soldiers. Now I sympathize with the CO and with Lou’s thinking. To my mind, battalion-level command is the first level of indirect command, a combat leader’s first possibility of using the tactics of the indirect approach in war. The size and shape of current battalions as well as the need to generate forces at the lowest tactical grouping means that units are not trained as units, COs do not get the experience of indirect command that they should and, most significantly, force generation usually means generating people to form forces to generate.

While we can sympathize with the CO and with MacKenzie, the situation within the artillery is somewhat different. The battery has long been the building block and the ability to plug and play has long been the hallmark of artillery effectiveness. The unique ability of commonwealth gunners to mass fire was one of the means by which the Canadian crossing of the Rhine was relatively easy. Those of you who remember Uncle Stanley’s talk on the subject will know what I mean. Our Artillery has been network centric for the past 60 years. The unique concept of controlling resources at the highest level possible and commanding fire at the lowest level means that the function of artillery has been command-centric for a long time, limited only by the technology in use.

Paradoxically, there is a risk that army transformation may diminish our ability to plug and play. There are several reasons for this:

First, the RCA has had little reason or opportunity to demonstrate its capacity for plug and play, both to itself and to others, since the end of the Cold War. Personally, I recall participating in an exercise where 20 batteries from eight regiments plugged in together, engaged a common fireplan and then dispersed.

Secondly, transformation seems to be focused at integrating disparate building blocks aimed at increasing the effectiveness of the lowest tactical element – the combat team and by extension the battle group. At this level, the concept of centralized control of artillery resources so necessary for effective plug and play becomes irrelevant. Similarly, the concept of commanding the fire of all guns in range from the front is also usurped when little is expected than what exists within the battle group. Plug and play then is a long held gunner concept that is appropriate to our war fighting ability. Let us make sure that we enhance this capacity during transformation rather than undermine it through ignorance or expediency.

These then are some of the risks involved in transformation. There are others which I could mention, but I am sure you will pick up on some of these yourselves.

On the other hand and referring again to my transition model, it goes without saying that we have to transform ourselves so that we can effectively contribute to winning the peace, building the peace and keeping the peace as well as winning the war. The recent experiences of 2RCHA and 5RALC in Afghanistan provide us with a good place to start.

On the air defence side, transformation seems to be underway. I commend to you CO 4AD Regt, LCol Dana Clarke's recent article in the National Post on the ADATS in exercise Perfect Kill 4. I have long advocated that more emphasis be placed on the anti-tank capabilities of the ADATS equipment and that is being done. Again there are risks. Some would like to see the emphasis reversed and to downplay the AD function. To my mind, this is very risky for two reasons; AD training is more complex and the AD function reaches far beyond the local battle field of anti-armored warfare into the battle space of joint operations. It would be wrong to usurp this capability and function.

The second reason is more prosaic: the bang for the buck in using ADATS primarily as an anti-tank weapon is not great. The weapon costs more than the target.

The spin off from AD transformation involves several reserve units which must be fairly treated.

These then are some of the factors to be considered as we go about the process of transforming ourselves, a process which we must take on passionately but with a view to the longer term. The details I leave to you.

In closing, I would like to congratulate all gunner units of LFCA for their fine exercise in Patawawa last month. LCol Brazill of 7 (To) Regt deserves much credit. I would also like to highlight the experience of 56 Regt whose gunners took to the mortars like fish to water and proved that being a gunner first allows us take on these other systems with ease. The key is being a gunner first. Congratulations to you all.

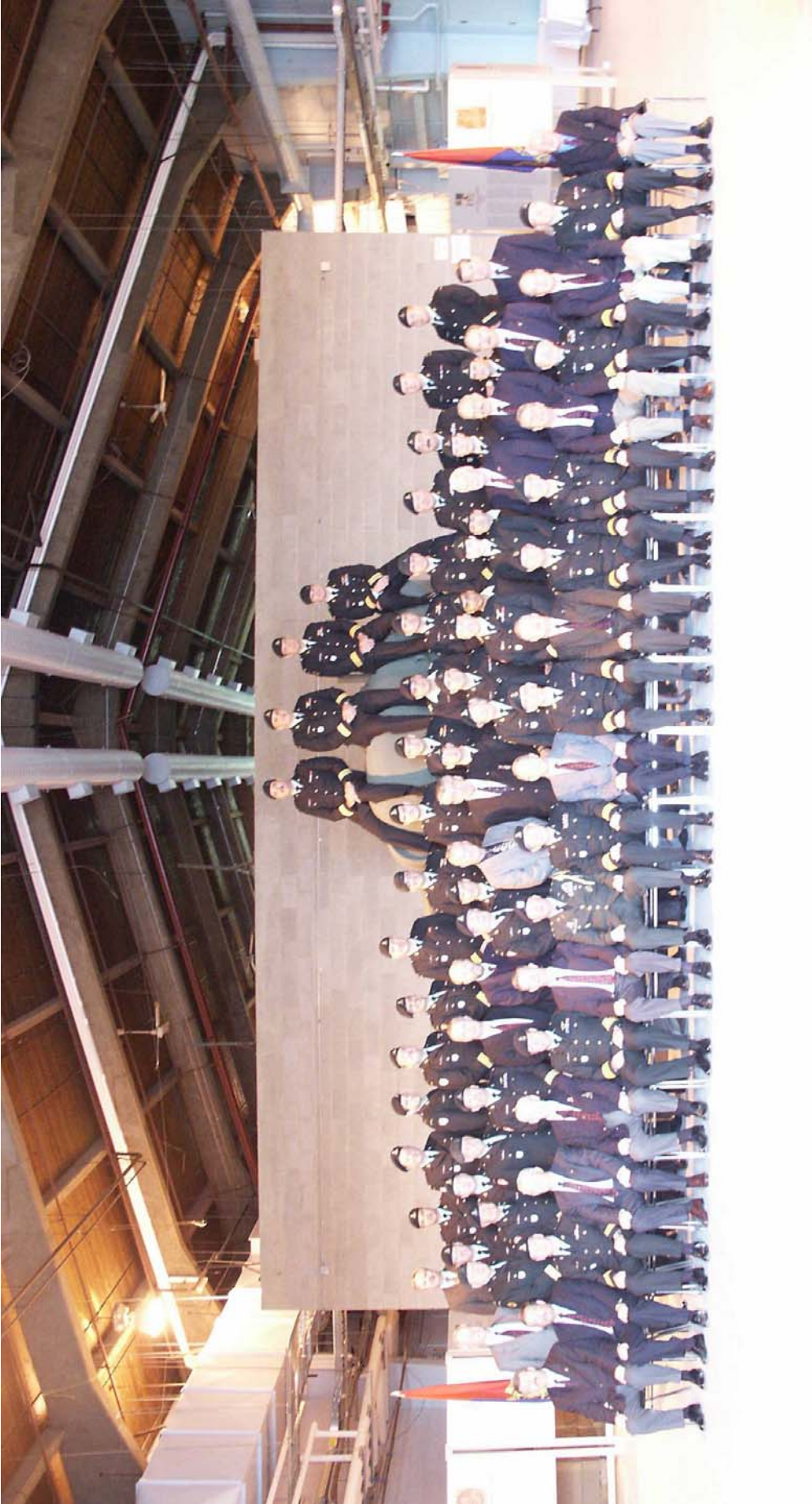
