

Message from the Colonel Commandant

Message du Colonel Commandant

This past year, serving as the Colonel Commandant of the Royal Regiment of Canadian Artillery has been both an honour and a privilege. The following report outlines key activities undertaken throughout the year, emphasizing engagement, leadership development, operational success, and the preservation of the Regiment's rich history.

In March 2023, a significant highlight was the visit to Op PALACI, where avalanche control gunners from across Canada were stationed in Rogers Pass through the winter. This visit, accompanied by the Regimental Colonel and the RSM RCA, was not merely a ceremonial gesture but a crucial effort to connect with the gunners and leaders on the ground, and understand the challenges they face in unique operational environments. The work done by Op PALACI is a vital contribution to the economic well-being of our country and hearing the enthusiasm with which the Transport Canada staff spoke of the work accomplished by our gunners was truly inspiring. Engaging with the gunners involved in avalanche control operations provided invaluable insights and reinforced the personal connection between the command structure and those executing critical missions.

The Regimental Leaders Course conducted at the Home Station in CFB Shilo, Manitoba, in September 2023 stands as a testament to the commitment to professional development and leadership excellence within the artillery. As the Colonel Commandant, active involvement in this successful course was a privilege for me in fostering a culture of continuous learning and skill enhancement among artillery officers. The course's success reflects the dedication of both the participants and the leadership towards maintaining high standards of competence within the Regiment. Furthermore, the dedicated support provided by 1 RCHA, the Regimental HQ staff, and the RCA Museum made the course the success it was.

Op HUSKY 2023 presented a significant historical achievement for The Royal Regiment of Canadian Artillery. The active participation of gunners, comprising many CAF participants, and a large part of the support staff, underscored the Regiment's effectiveness and adaptability. This success is a result of meticulous planning and the dedication of the team led by a former Gunner Honorary Colonel, Mr. Steve Gregory, MSM. The ability to contribute substantially to commemorative events like this reaffirms the Regiment's integral role in maintaining our heritage.

Participating in the well-attended St Barbara's Day dinner in Vancouver, hosted by the 15th Field Artillery Regiment, RCA, highlighted the importance of traditions and community within the artillery. The event served as a platform for fostering camaraderie and acknowledging the dedication of the Regiment's members. Ably hosted by the CO, LCol Grieve, and Honorary LCol Foster, the large participation from the units of the Vancouver Garrison served to reinforce the significance of maintaining strong bonds and celebrating the rich heritage of The Royal Regiment of Canadian Artillery.

The work of our Association over the past year has continued to support the retired and serving community of Gunners across Canada. The webinars that provided an opportunity to hear from prominent Gunners on subjects of current and historical value were just one of the programmes offered by our Association. Its support to the publishing of "With a Few Guns," narrating the stories of Gunners in Afghanistan,

Message from the Senior Serving Gunner

Fellow Gunners of The Royal Regiment – it is an honour to once again take a moment to acknowledge your efforts and contributions to the Canadian Armed Forces. I will leave it to others to highlight the incredible individual and collective accomplishments, but let me say that across all ranks, Regular and Reserve, you continue to soldier with professionalism and dedication. From Op LENTUS to Op REASSURANCE and those engaged in the force development and acquisition space to all Gunners working on important institutional matters, which include the modernization and evolution of our collective culture and operating environment – let me start by saying thank you. You all continue to perform admirably.

It is no secret or surprise that the world continues to become more dangerous. We find ourselves in a polycrisis, multiple crises that overlap and feed into each other, inflaming overall global instability. Simply put, we can anticipate more wars, more humanitarian disasters, more fires and floods, and more pandemics. All of this means that there will be an increased reliance on the CAF and an increased demand on all of you. We must be ready. It is incumbent on all of us to maximize opportunities during training and deployments to evolve and prepare. Therefore, you must be bold, experiment, and make the most of finite opportunities and resources. Share lessons learned and remain professionally curious. This is how we will ensure our readiness.

On Op REASSURANCE, the Canadian-led Battle Group continues transitioning towards becoming a Multinational Brigade as part of our NATO commitments. As a result, the Commander of the Canadian Army (CCA), LGen Paul, has been a vocal advocate for rapidly increasing Canadian artillery capabilities through several un-forecasted urgent operational requirements (UOR) that include Very Short-Range Air Defence (VSHORAD) and Counter-UAS (CUAS) systems. The Indirect Fire Modernization (IFM) project continues at pace as one of CCA's Top 3 procurement priorities, and the VCDS has supported the SP Howitzer UOR in principle (understanding funding will need to be identified). We have never been better positioned than we are today. If you have not read the RCA Modernization Narrative, read it. This is our Corps' modernization centre of gravity and our handrail to ensure that we speak with one voice regarding the way forward. With the acquisition of new fires systems, The Royal Regiment will look to all of you to integrate and operationalize them in a timely manner. This includes developing new doctrine, delivering associated training, and evolving our tactics, techniques, and procedures to make us more lethal and resilient. I ask all of you charged with such duties to take them seriously as we must be ready to face emerging challenges when they arise.

Change is not confined to the operational realm. Institutionally, we will soon have a new Chief of the Defence Staff. In the coming months, we will bid farewell to Gen Eyre, who has been an exceptional CDS, leading us through particularly challenging times. General Eyre is a champion for the profession of arms, our people, and our mission. He has been a great friend to the Canadian Army and The Royal Regiment, and he will be missed. By the time this volume is published, a new CDS will likely have been named. Regardless of who that is, we must ensure that we continue to operate at the highest levels of professionalism to maintain the trust and confidence that has been a hallmark of The Royal Regiment of Canadian Artillery. Additionally, LGen Paul will retire this summer. I want to thank LGen Paul for his strong support to the Gunner community and his sustained efforts to modernize the Canadian Army.

Chers artilleurs, chères artilleuses du Régiment royal, c'est encore une fois un honneur de prendre le temps de saluer vos efforts et de souligner les contributions que vous avez apportées aux Forces armées canadiennes. Je laisserai à d'autres le soin de souligner vos réalisations individuelles et collectives incroyables, mais je tiens à vous dire qu'au sein de tous les grades, dans la Force régulière et la Force de réserve, vous perséverez dans votre mission de soldat avec professionnalisme et dévouement. À tous ceux qui sont déployés dans le cadre de l'Op LENTUS et de l'Op REASSURANCE, à ceux qui participent au développement des forces et à l'espace d'acquisition, et à tous les artilleurs et artilleuses qui travaillent sur des affaires institutionnelles importantes, ce qui comprend la modernisation et l'évolution de notre culture collective et notre environnement opérationnel – permettez-moi d'abord de vous remercier. Vous continuez tous à effectuer votre travail de manière admirable.

Le fait que le monde continue de devenir de plus en plus dangereux n'est pas un secret et n'a rien d'étonnant. Nous sommes confrontés à des polycrises, c'est-à-dire de nombreuses crises qui se chevauchent et qui s'alimentent les unes les autres, ce qui met le feu à l'instabilité mondiale générale. En termes simples, nous pouvons nous attendre à plus de guerres, à plus de catastrophes pour l'humanité, à plus d'incendies et d'inondations, et à plus de pandémies. Ainsi, il y aura un recours accru aux FAC et des exigences accrues sur vous tous. Nous devons être prêts. Il nous incombe à tous de maximiser les possibilités lors de l'entraînement et des déploiements afin d'évoluer et de nous préparer. Vous devez donc être audacieux, puis expérimenter et saisir le nombre limité de possibilités et de ressources. Échangez les leçons retenues et demeurez curieux sur le plan professionnel. C'est ainsi que nous garantirons notre état de disponibilité opérationnelle.

Dans le cadre de l'Op REASSURANCE, le groupement tactique dirigé par le Canada continue de progresser pour devenir une brigade multinationale dans le cadre de nos engagements de l'OTAN. Par conséquent, le Lgén Paul, commandant de l'Armée canadienne (cmdt AC), a été un ardent défenseur de l'augmentation rapide des capacités de l'artillerie du Canada. Il a de ce fait approuvé plusieurs besoins opérationnels urgents (BOU) non prévus, notamment les systèmes de défense anti-aérienne à très courte portée (DAATCP) et de lutte contre les systèmes aériens sans pilote (CUAS). Le projet de modernisation des systèmes de tir indirect suit son cours en tant que l'une des trois principales priorités d'acquisition du cmdt AC, et le VCEDM a appuyé en principe le BOU de l'obusier AM (il est entendu qu'il faudra établir une source de financement). Nous sommes dans une meilleure position que jamais. Si vous n'avez pas lu le message sur la de modernisation de l'ARC, lisez-le. Il s'agit du centre de gravité de la modernisation de notre Corps et de notre ligne directrice pour veiller à ce que nous parlions d'une seule voix concernant l'avenir. Avec l'acquisition de nouveaux systèmes de tir, le Régiment royal comptera sur vous tous pour les intégrer et les rendre opérationnels en temps opportun. Cela comprend l'élaboration d'une nouvelle doctrine, la prestation d'un entraînement connexe et l'évolution de nos tactiques, techniques et procédures pour que nous soyons plus létaux et résilients. Je demande donc à chacun d'entre vous qui se verra confier de telles tâches de les prendre au sérieux, car nous devons être prêts à relever de nouveaux défis lorsqu'ils surviennent.

Le changement ne se limite pas aux opérations. Sur le plan institutionnel, nous aurons bientôt un nouveau chef d'état-major de la défense (CEMD).



Shifting to our most precious resource – people – I would be remiss if I did not acknowledge the life challenges that many of you face. I know that some of you are struggling with housing, family medical support and jobs, and making ends meet. Post-pandemic, our country finds itself in challenging financial times, which affects all of you. This is not lost on the CAF leadership and efforts are being made to improve the situation. Although change may seem slow, and I know there is frustration, help is on the way. In the meantime, if you are struggling, I would ask that you please reach out to your chain of command, to peers, and to the many services that are available on base. There are many ways that you can get help; don't try to go it alone.

Once again, I thank each of you for your heavy lifting and continued service to country. I equally wish to thank your families for their unfailing support and sacrifice; we cannot achieve what we achieve without their reinforcing fires, which do not go unnoticed. Know that I am immensely proud to serve as your Senior Serving Gunner. My best wishes to every member of the Regimental family, and good shooting for 2024!

Another year has seemingly flown by with some significant steps forward in the advancement of Artillery modernization having been made across The Royal Regiment. The Artillery has never been better positioned or supported than it is right now with our value proposition undeniable.

In an ever-changing global security landscape, the ability to adapt and evolve is paramount. Recent conflicts, such as Ukraine's war with Russia, have served as poignant reminders of the criticality of agility, flexibility, and adaptability when it comes to warfighting in a modern battlespace. The RCA and the CA are taking these lessons to heart, having embarked on a journey of modernization aimed at ensuring they remain lethal, agile, and relevant in an uncertain world.

The Evolving Battlefield

The conflict in Ukraine has highlighted several key lessons for modern militaries. One of the most striking take-aways is the need for advanced artillery capabilities – capabilities that have proven battle-changing. In the face of hybrid warfare tactics and massed fires supported by uncrewed aerial systems (UAS) and precision strikes, contemporary artillery units must be equipped with state-of-the-art systems that offer increased range, accuracy, and firepower. From cannon artillery, forward observers, and weapons locating sensors to uncrewed aerial systems, target acquisition radars, and air defence, the RCA has recognized this imperative and – with the full support of the CCA – is investing in upgrading its equipment to meet the challenges of today and into the future.

RCA Contributions to Op REASSURANCE

The force generation (FG) of an organization like a soon to be established Artillery Battalion Group is what the RCA exists for. We failed to hoist this aboard during our years in Afghanistan, losing out on a tremendous opportunity to grow and evolve as a Corps. Given Canada's framework nation status, the interoperability and integration of broad fire support assets will be paramount to the fielding of a combat capable force. While the sustained FG of this organization will not be easy and will push the Corps to its maximum capacity (something it has not lived in recent memory), our contribution of over 250 Gunners and 75 supporting CSS personnel from more than 15 different trades deployed persistently to Op REASSURANCE every rotation to deliver SENSE, SHIELD, and ACT functions is significant and will set the stage for our continued advancements with respect to how we deliver effects into the future.

The Modernization Imperative

Modern warfare is increasingly reliant on technology and information warfare. Our Ukrainian partners are actively integrating cutting-edge yet oftentimes simple application-based technology to react to Russian tactics and with a view to delivering lethal artillery effects rapidly to achieve the advantage. Whether through enhanced usage of drones to enable the delivery of indirect long range precision fires (LRPF) on depth high

Militaires, amis et amies du Royal Regiment,

Une nouvelle année s'est apparemment écoulée et des progrès considérables ont été réalisés dans la modernisation de l'Artillerie au sein du Royal Regiment. L'Artillerie n'a jamais été aussi bien positionnée et appuyée qu'à l'heure actuelle, et notre proposition de valeur est incontestable.

Dans un contexte où la sécurité mondiale demeure en constante évolution, la capacité d'adaptation et d'évolution est primordiale. D'ailleurs, les conflits récents, notamment la guerre entre l'Ukraine et la Russie, sont un rappel poignant de l'importance de l'agilité, de la souplesse et de l'adaptabilité lorsque vient le temps de mener la guerre dans un espace de combat moderne. L'Artillerie royale canadienne (ARC) et l'Armée canadienne (AC) prennent ces leçons à cœur et se sont lancées dans un processus de modernisation afin de s'assurer de demeurer létales, agiles et pertinentes devant l'incertitude mondiale.

Le champ de bataille en évolution

Le conflit en Ukraine a mis en lumière plusieurs leçons essentielles pour les armées modernes. L'une des conclusions les plus frappantes concerne la nécessité de disposer de capacités d'artillerie avancées, des capacités qui ont changé le cours des batailles. Face aux tactiques de guerre hybrides et aux tirs massifs soutenus par des systèmes aériens sans pilote (UAS) et des frappes de précision, les unités d'artillerie contemporaines doivent être dotées de systèmes de pointe dont la portée, la précision et la puissance de feu sont accrues. Qu'il s'agisse de canons d'artillerie, d'observateurs avancés, de capteurs de repérage d'armes, de systèmes aériens sans pilote, de radars d'acquisition d'objectifs ou de défense aérienne, l'ARC a reconnu ce besoin impératif et elle investit dans la modernisation de son équipement afin de relever les défis d'aujourd'hui et de demain. Elle dispose, à cet effet, du soutien total du cmdt AC.

Les contributions de l'ARC à l'Op REASSURANCE

La raison d'être de l'ARC, c'est la mise sur pied de la force (MPF) d'une organisation, telle que le groupe d'artillerie de bataillon qui sera bientôt créé. Or, nous n'avons pas réussi à nous approprier ce concept pendant nos années en Afghanistan. Nous avons ainsi perdu une formidable occasion de grandir et d'évoluer en tant que Corps. Compte tenu du statut de nation-cadre du Canada, l'interopérabilité et l'intégration de vastes ressources d'appui-feu seront primordiales pour la mise en service d'une force apte au combat. La MPF soutenue de l'organisation constituera un défi et poussera le Corps à sa capacité maximale (ce qu'il n'a pas vécu depuis longtemps). Cependant, notre contribution de plus de 250 artilleurs et artilleuses et de 75 membres du personnel de soutien logistique du combat (SLC) issus et issues de plus de 15 métiers différents est significative. Ces militaires, qui participent à des déploiements en continu dans le cadre des rotations de l'Op REASSURANCE, fournissent les fonctions de DÉTECTION, de PROTECTION et d'ACTION. Ils et elles prépareront également le terrain aux progrès continus que nous connaissons en ce qui concerne la manière de produire les effets de demain.



value targets or the use of vast open-source information and artificial intelligence (AI) to generate potential targets, Ukraine is the embodiment of agility and adaptation daily to counter an ever-evolving adversary. Western armies have much to learn from this conflict and must incorporate lessons learned to ensure they are postured to fight current and future fights, not that of the past.

The CA has identified a requirement for a separate and distinct indirect fires capability to provide fire support to forces dispersed over greatly expanded areas of operation. The complexity associated with supporting dispersed forces over a large area requires systems that possess increased range, precision, scalable lethality, and mobility that are digitally connected and fully interoperable with allies.

Potential adversaries have artillery capabilities that presently significantly outrange CA capabilities – this is a known fact. The Army equally does not currently have the indirect fires systems to fight in large-scale combat operations. In the event of the invocation of an Article 5 response, Canadian soldiers and supporting allies would be at significant risk of adversary rocket and artillery strikes without any ability to return fire and defeat threats. This capability deficiency reduces the deterrent effect and credibility of a soon to be established Canadian-led multinational brigade.

For the RCA, this means providing project options and fires expertise to the CA on artillery systems that would be better suited to a battlespace characterized by greatly increased areas of operation, massed fires supported by UAS, hugely responsive counter-fires capabilities and digitized fires. The current threat is demanding that the RCA be incredibly mobile to increase its strategic projectability and survivability, highly lethal to ensure every round fired is worth the exposure to adversary counter-fires, and enabled from a range, precision, and connectivity perspective.

With this front of mind, the RCA's Future Fires Concept and Modernization Narratives have both been endorsed and published concurrent to continued project work for Indirect Fires Modernization (IFM) – which will include modernized systems for both the Regular and Reserve Forces – and LRPF. Urgent operational requirements (UOR) for Very Short-Range Air Defence (VSHORAD), Counter-UAS, and Loitering Munitions (LM) are all underway at varying degrees of progress, with the RBS 70 VSHORAD system formally announced on 15 February by the government and anticipated for deployment as part of Op REASSURANCE in 2025.

Acknowledging that the M777 is inadequate for large scale combat operations, a Statement of Capability Deficiency (SOCD) for Self-Propelled (SP) Howitzers was submitted. The VCDS has recently supported this with the endorsement of a Letter of Initiation for the SP UOR, which now sees ADM (Mat) and DLR-2 working to refine options. This capability would not only equip the RCA with highly lethal, mobile, and survivable guns, but also an exceptional ability to better develop its understanding on how modern, automated guns can support an operational formation.

While the operational requirement for modern guns is clear, a funding strategy is still being developed that will enable work towards delivering this critical capability. These more traditional artillery systems, employed in combination with the RCA's Medium Range Radar (MRR), the CU-172 Blackjack Small UAS, the Air Defence Cell (ADC), and impending air defence and C-UAS capabilities, will see The Royal Regiment being the most modernized Corps in the CA.

The Road Ahead

While we have so very much to be proud of, substantially daunting tasks lie ahead to ensure that the artillery possesses the mobility, lethality, and survivability to deliver guaranteed battle-winning effects against a peer adversary. Issues ranging from national healthcare, housing, and debt demands to a challenged defence industry and the US position on Canadian commitments to NATO all impact modernization efforts.

This said, positivity about who we are as a Royal Regiment and what we bring (and will bring) to the battlespace will be critical. We simply need to acknowledge these realities, focus on priorities, and keep our eye on the prize – with the prize being the most recapitalized Corps in the Canadian Army over the next decade or so. CCA is seized with our challenges and is working extremely hard to ensure we are supported through procurement and recruitment. The RCA's future is very promising – we are in high demand, our credibility as a Corps is very high, and it truly is a hugely exciting time to be a Gunner!

L'impératif en matière de modernisation

La guerre moderne repose de plus en plus sur la technologie et la guerre de l'information. Nos partenaires d'Ukraine intègrent activement des technologies de pointe, mais souvent simples, fondées sur des applications, afin de réagir aux tactiques russes et de produire rapidement des effets d'artillerie létaux pour prendre l'avantage. L'Ukraine fait preuve, au quotidien, d'agilité et d'adaptation pour contrer un adversaire en constante évolution. À cet effet, citons leur utilisation accrue de drones pour permettre des tirs de précision indirects à longue portée (TPLP) sur des objectifs de grande importance en profondeur ou leur recours à de vastes informations et à l'intelligence artificielle (IA) de source ouverte pour générer des cibles potentielles. Les armées occidentales ont beaucoup à apprendre du conflit et doivent intégrer les leçons retenues pour s'assurer d'être prêtes à mener les combats d'aujourd'hui et de demain, et non ceux du passé.

L'AC a déterminé qu'elle avait besoin d'une capacité de feux indirects séparée et distincte pour fournir un appui-feu à des forces dispersées dans des zones d'opération très étendues. Or, la tâche complexe d'appuyer des forces dispersées dans une zone vaste requiert des systèmes dotés d'une portée, d'une précision, d'une létalité modulable et d'une mobilité accrues, lesquels sont connectés numériquement et totalement interoperables avec ceux des alliés.

Les adversaires potentiels disposent de capacités d'artillerie qui dépassent largement, à l'heure actuelle, les capacités de l'AC – c'est bien connu. Dans le même ordre d'idée, l'Armée ne possède pas, présentement, de systèmes de tirs indirects pour rivaliser dans des opérations de combat à grande échelle. Dans l'éventualité où on invoquerait une intervention en vertu de l'article 5, les militaires canadiens et canadiennes et les armées alliées courraient un risque important, celui des attaques de missiles et d'artillerie, sans être en mesure de riposter aux tirs et de vaincre les menaces. Cette lacune en matière de capacité diminue l'effet dissuasif et la crédibilité d'une brigade multinationale dirigée par le Canada, brigade qui sera bientôt mise sur pied.

Pour l'ARC, cela signifie fournir à l'AC des options de projet et de l'expertise en matière de tirs concernant des systèmes d'artillerie mieux adaptés à un environnement d'opérations caractérisé par des zones d'opérations plus vastes, par des tirs massifs appuyés par UAS, par des capacités de tirs contre armes très adaptés et par des tirs numérisés. La menace actuelle exige que l'ARC soit extrêmement mobile pour renforcer sa capacité de projection stratégique et de survie. De plus, elle doit être hautement létale pour que chaque balle tirée vaille la peine d'être exposée aux contre-feux ennemis et dotée d'une portée, d'une précision et d'une connectivité accrues.

C'est dans cette optique que le concept d'artillerie de demain et les exposés narratifs sur la modernisation de l'ARC ont été tous deux étudiés, approuvés et publiés, ce qui est survenu en même temps que la poursuite des travaux liés au projet de modernisation du tir indirect (MTI) – qui comprendra des systèmes modernisés pour la Force régulière et la Force de réserve – et au TPLP. Les besoins opérationnels urgents (BOU) en matière de défense aérienne à très courte portée (VSHORAD), d'anti-UAS et de munitions rôdeuses sont en train d'être élaborés et sont rendus à divers niveaux d'achèvement. Entre autres, le 15 février, le gouvernement a fait une annonce officielle au sujet du système de VSHORAD RBS 70. On s'attend à ce que son déploiement ait lieu en 2025, dans le cadre de l'opération REASSURANCE.

Étant donné que le M777 n'est pas adapté aux opérations de combat à grande échelle, un énoncé d'insuffisance en capacités (EIC) concernant les obusiers automoteurs (AM) a été présenté. Le Vice-Chef d'état-major de la défense (VCMD) a récemment soutenu cette démarche en approuvant une lettre de mise en œuvre pour les BOU AM. À l'heure actuelle, le SMA(Mat) et le Directeur – Besoins en ressources terrestres 2 (DBRT 2) travaillent à peaufiner les options. Une telle capacité permettrait non seulement à l'ARC de disposer de pièces d'artillerie hautement meurtrières, mobiles et survivables, mais aussi de mieux comprendre comment des pièces d'artillerie modernes et automatisées peuvent appuyer une formation opérationnelle.

Bien que les exigences opérationnelles liées aux pièces d'artillerie modernes soient claires, une stratégie de financement est encore en cours d'élaboration, ce qui permettra d'œuvrer à la prestation de cette capacité essentielle. Ces systèmes d'artillerie plus traditionnels feront du Royal Regiment le corps d'armée le plus modernisé de l'AC. Ils seront utilisés conjointement avec le radar à moyenne portée (RMP) de l'ARC, le petit UAS CU-172 Blackjack, la cellule de défense anti-aérienne (CDA) et les capacités imminentes en matière de défense aérienne et de système de défense contre les aéronefs sans pilote à bord (C-UAS).







2023 was another exciting year at the 1st Regiment, Royal Canadian Horse Artillery (1 RCHA). It began with B Battery conducting a relief in place of A "The Queen's" Battery for the Regiment's second consecutive rotation on Op REASSURANCE in Latvia. Back at the home station, it was business as usual with career courses, taskings, and training underway in the new year.

February saw members of 1 RCHA travelling to Edmonton to compete in Ex STRONG CONTENDER where they faced-off against other units within 1 Canadian Mechanized Brigade Group in a variety of sporting events. The Regiment put forth a strong showing, especially in the Tactical Athlete and Grappling competitions. Unfortunately, no first-place banners were brought back, but the competitors are now even more motivated to redeem themselves in 2024.

After returning from Edmonton, the Regiment shifted focus towards the first major exercise of the calendar year, Ex FROZEN GUNNER. During this weeklong field training exercise, the Regiment fine-tuned their skills on the conduct of Harassing Fire missions, Sniping Gun, Open Actions, and Quick Actions. The RCPO and C Battery helped push digital fires even further, successfully communicating between the lightweight counter-mortar radar and the gunline Command Post. C Battery also trialed the MASRAM AWLS during live missions. By the time the exercise was all said and done, 1 RCHA had fired over 900 rounds of 155mm ammunition, including rocket assisted projectiles and Precision Guidance Kit (PGK).

The month of March kicked off with a Change of Command for Headquarters and Services Battery between Major Ryan Telfer and the in-coming Battery Commander, Major Pete Little. The Regiment finished the month off with a rather memorable experience by conducting a brief which re-

viewed "Trusted to Serve," the Canadian Armed Forces publication on Ethos. The highlight of which was an hour-long keynote engagement with Jocko Willink, retired US Navy Seal, who helped reflect on our ethical principles, military values, and professional expectations as members of the profession of arms.

Despite a relatively busy spring, the Regiment settled back into a regular battle rhythm for the summer which included running several in-house PCF courses and support to various taskings throughout the country, specifically the National Sentry Program where members from 1 RCHA would proudly stand sentry at the Tomb of the Unknown Soldier in Ottawa. Following Artillery Day celebrations, the Command Team made its first challenge to the Regiment in the form of Ex TOUGH GUNNER. This test of strength, endurance, and mental resilience would see the Regiment conduct a grueling 21-kilometer ruck-sack march combined with the obstacles course. Hard work, dedication, and exceptional teamwork were displayed by all participants.

June would see the Regiment conducting two Change of Commands at the Battery level. First, A "The Queen's" Battery conducted a Change of Command between Major Matthew Stickland and the in-coming Battery Commander, Major Chris Lewington. Shortly after, C Battery conducted a Change of Command between Major Jamie Hill and in-coming Battery Commander, Major Todd Everett. Around this same timeframe, the Regiment welcomed home members of B Battery from their deployment to Latvia. The month concluded with 1 RCHA hosting a firepower demonstration to celebrate Family Day. The event was held as a small token of our appreciation to acknowledge the vital role that our families play in supporting the day-to-day operation of the Regiment. Concurrently, RHQ RCA and The Shilo Gunner Reunion Committee hosted the Artillery Reunion which also aligned with the start of the Regiment's 125th Anniversary celebrations.

To close out the summer, Commander 3rd Canadian Division, Brigadier-General Steven Graham, visited the Regiment to hand out some Honours and Awards. Captain Marshall Mainprize was awarded a Canadian Joint Operations Command Commendation for the development and implementation of courseware focused on the training of multi-national counterparts with regards to the use of Precision-Guided Munitions. MBdr Dillon Saunders was also presented with a Canadian Joint Operations Command Commendation for their exceptional dedication and leadership on Op



REASSURANCE. In addition to the individual awards, 1 RCHA received a Division Commander Commendation for its extraordinary fundraising efforts as part of the National Defence Workplace Charitable Campaign.

With fires blazing across the country, August and September were intense months for the Regiment as 1 RCHA was upgraded from the follow-on force to the headquarters and vanguard elements for Joint Task Force West - Immediate Response Unit. In response to a request for assistance from the province of British Columbia, the Regiment unexpectedly deployed a Sub-Unit sized element in support of wildfire relief as part of Op LENTUS. These soldiers helped prevent the further spread of wildfires under the Command of Captain James Koh and MWO Jason Van Damme.

In September, members of the Regiment were back on the road to Edmonton to compete in Ex MOUNTAIN RAM, a 1 CMBG fitness challenge that would challenge the team to test themselves both mentally and physically. With everyone back from summer block leave, the Regiment began to prepare for the second major exercise of the calendar year, Ex LIMBER GUNNER. During this two-week long field training exercise, 1 RCHA fired over 2,200 rounds of all natures of 155mm ammunition, including Precision-Guided and Rocket-Assisted Projectiles. Most of these rounds were delivered through digital fire missions, but the Regiment also ensured that they had the skills to work in an analogue capacity. 1 RCHA mastered firing point procedures to enhance their speed and survivability, while fine-tuning their lethality with precision munitions. Ex LIMBER GUNNER also involved 38 ATG in digital fire plans and 408 Tactical Helicopter Squadron in Close Combat Attack and air observation post missions. This exercise displayed that 1 RCHA is prepared to deploy in support of Canadians in any capacity, including combat operations.

With the year's major training wrapped-up, the Regiment focused on completing annual briefs as part of Ex READY GUNNER and Individual Battle Task Standards. On 1 December 2023, 1 RCHA marked its 125th Anniversary with a Sports Day and BBQ, including the unveiling of the Captain Jeff Francis Cup, a poignant tribute to his sacrifice on Task Force 1-07 in Afghanistan. The Command Team made its second challenge to the Regiment in December in the form of the Gunner's Fitness Gauntlet. This was a PSP-programmed event which included six events over the span of two-days that tested the physical capacity of our members and their preparedness for the grueling demands of combat.

The Regiment closed out the year in typical fashion hosting the Kingston Cup on Saint Barbara's Day. This year, A "The Queen's" Battery took home the Kingston Cup with an impressive 11-3 victory over B Battery. Another highlight of the "silly season" events was the athletic performance of Gnr Robertson, a member of B Battery, who won the title of fittest female during the Gunners' Fitness Gauntlet and won the Ex HEAVY LOADER powerlifting competition, securing the Saint Barbara's belt in the process.

With 2023 in the books, the Regiment looks forward to the challenges and opportunities that 2024 will bring as we prepare for our upcoming role as the lead mounting unit for Op IMPACT, and another gun battery deploying on Op REASSURANCE later in the year.

A "The Queen's" Battery

In the wake of the New Year, members of A "The Queen's" Battery returned from a well-deserved break, marking the end of a challenging six-month deployment in Latvia as part of Op REASSURANCE. The Battery quickly transitioned to Ex FROZEN GUNNER, a testament to their commitment and professionalism. The exercise encompassed several demanding tasks, including providing support for various courses, while simultaneously fulfilling their own training objectives. The Battery's versatility shone through as they adeptly tackled these challenges.

As the winter turned to spring, the Battery faced a new set of challenges. Designated as the Immediate Response Unit for Western Canada, they undertook extensive preparations to respond swiftly to any emerging situations in the region. In a proactive move, the Battery engaged in Wild Land Firefighter training, showcasing their adaptability and commitment to serving the community beyond their military duties.

Additionally, the month marked not only a shift in the seasons, but also a significant transition for the Battery as it bid farewell to the outgoing lead-

ers, Major Stickland and MWO Flynn, and welcomed the incoming Command Team, Major Lewington and MWO Fortin.

In June, "The Queen's" Battery ventured into the picturesque landscapes of Canmore, Alberta, as part of their deployment for Ex ADVENTURE GUNNER. This unique adventure training initiative aimed to unite soldiers in demanding environments, fostering cohesion through activities like white water rafting, caving, and rock climbing. The experience not only provided a break from routine, but also contributed to the holistic development of soldiers, preparing them for future military operations.

The fall brought Exercise LIMBER GUNNER, a two-week deployment focusing on survivability in a dynamic environment. Throughout the exercise, the Battery honed their speed and lethality through unique deployments that emphasized survivability in the face of a persistent ground and Unmanned Aerial Systems (UAS) opposing force presence. The Battery demonstrated lethal, agile, and resourceful capabilities, refining both digital and analogue skills for combat readiness.

As the year concluded, the Battery triumphed on the ice, securing an 11-3 victory in the historic Kingston Cup showdown against B Battery. The Kingston Cup, dating back to the 19th century, is the oldest sports competition in the Canadian Armed Forces, symbolizing tradition, teamwork, and friendly competition.

Throughout the year, the Battery exhibited resilience and dedication not only in military operations, but also in communal service and recreational pursuits. Acclaimed from superiors and peers recognized their hard

work, increasing morale and contributing significantly to the overall preparedness of the unit. As they reflect on a year of trials and triumphs, the members of A "The Queen's" Battery stand as examples of duty, honour, and service, ready for whatever challenges 2024 may bring.

B Battery

B Battery had a busy year in 2023. The Battery deployed to Latvia, ran multiple courses, had an eventful silly season, and a successful regimental exercise.

Just prior to the beginning of 2023, B Battery deployed on Op REASSURANCE. The Battery, under the name "Banshee" while part of the Enhanced Forward Presence Battle Group, participated in multiple exercises. Ex WOLVERINE FORGE was the first exercise for the new rotation in February. Ex WOLVERINE SHIELD/STRIKE provided the opportunity to conduct fire missions at Camp Adazi in March. In May, Ex SPRING STORM saw 11 NATO countries and 14,000 military personnel, including Banshee Battery, deploy to Estonia to train in an urban environment. The Battery also participated in the biannual Baltic Warrior Race, which consisted of a 16-kilometer rucksack march, a 1-kilometer canoe portage, a 15-kilometer paddle, and finally a 500-meter sprint to the end. After 6 months of hard work, B Battery returned to Canada in June 2023.

After their return, members of the Battery went on a well-deserved leave period followed by a restructuring as those members who augmented the deployment returned to their respective Batteries. There was also a change of appointment as MWO Jason Van Damme took over as the BSM from MWO Robert Fiander.

B Battery ran several courses throughout the late summer and early fall, including a Detachment Commander/Detachment 2IC course and a pre-GATS workshop in preparation for GATS 2024. Ex LIMBER GUNNER took place in October in the Shilo training area. During the Battery portion of the exercise, B Battery focused on firing point and manoeuvre point deployments, while also supporting air observers as they called in fire. B Battery continued to hone their skills during the Regimental portion of the exercise, completing local defense training and multiple complex fire plans which included the use of rocket-assisted projectiles. At the end of the exercise, B Battery's gun detachment 25B (under Detachment Command-

er MBdr Clunas) was named the top detachment of 1 RCHA for Exercise LIMBER GUNNER.

At the 1 RCHA Dinner and Dance, MBdr Travis Swindell was awarded the CWO Stephen (Steve) Rice Junior Leadership Award for their outstanding work throughout the year.

After a productive 2023, B Battery is eager to continue the high tempo that has come to define 1 RCHA in the next year.

C Battery

2023 was an eventful year for the gunners of C Battery, marked by our pursuit of technical excellence, continued adaptation to the everchanging demands of modern warfare, and a dedication to development and new horizons as the RCA's premier STA Battery. C Battery was able to achieve all the goals laid out in the year of 2023 despite a shortage of resources and staffing. It was truly a year to remember as many soldiers had a unique opportunity to cross-train on the various STA kit and gain proficiency and confidence in our equipment.

Under the command of Battery Commander and BSM, members of the Battery began the year once again by participating in Ex FROZEN GUNNER. Our soldiers braved frigid conditions consisting of -40°C to validate the Battery which included MUAS flights and LCMR/AWLS deployments under the watchful eye of battery leadership. This also provided the opportunity for the STACC to refine their skills for the busy year ahead while supporting the validation of 1 RCHA and 1 CMBG. Additionally, members of the Battery were able to fire HALO and LCMR live in the Shilo Training Area to reinforce their knowledge and skills on calls for fire. This was a sight to be seen and a testament to our soldiers' resiliency in the face of the harshest weather Manitoba has to offer.

To maintain its high standard, C Battery deployed on Ex WESTERN GUNNER in collaboration with 38 ATG. This training allowed soldiers to return to a tactical setting, employing equipment to conduct counter-battery efforts and demonstrating their diverse capabilities. The exercise placed a heavy emphasis on counter-UAS and high-mobility Tactics Techniques and Procedures in a contested environment. C Battery was able to reinforce its capabilities and achieve live STA Battle Task Standards.



Gnr Robertson claimed victory as the champion of the 2023 Ex HEAVY LOADER powerlifting competition in mid-December. She is the first female in the 11-year history of the competition to win the overall title.

Nevertheless, the requirement for individual training did not stop. C Battery supported the conduct of multiple RCAS courses, while concurrently conducting its own PCF courses consisting of LCMR Operator, AWLS Detachment Member, and TAPV RWS Operator. The Battery also identified the importance of individual soldiering skills and Troop-/Section-level dismounted drills and made a conscious effort to regularly conduct PWTs and rehearsals of dismounted drills.

Another highlight of the year was Op BOLD REQUEST in October in Denmark. An LCMR detachment,

under the command of Sgt Sopkow, was sent on this multi-national joint demonstration of sensor capabilities. CAF's sense capabilities were presented to the Command Teams of multiple NATO organizations. C Battery represented the CAF in a professional and competent manner and demonstrated our technical proficiency and commitment to the modern warfighting environment.

To wrap up the year of 2023, C Battery's capabilities were proven effective on Ex LIMBER GUNNER. C Battery was able to maintain sense capabilities while continuously moving its hide and baseline throughout the exercise and demonstrating the capability to be agile and adaptable in the fast-paced environment of modern warfare. The exercise provided C Battery with insights on our strengths and shortcomings in an environment of high

UAV and counter-battery threat. Valuable information was obtained to assist in our training and identify areas of improvement in the coming year.

C Battery is preparing for a successful, yet demanding, 2024. In the short-term, the Battery will be focusing on developing new TTPs and conducting individual training to remain validated and sharpen our skills. In the long-term, the Battery will be deploying members on various operations across the globe. Additionally, C Battery is looking to receive Counter-UAS capability to expand the CAF's capabilities within the modern battlefield environment.

Z Battery

2023 was yet another successful and rewarding year for Z Battery which reinforced its ability to provide talent, professionalism, and experience on exercises and deployments, both foreign and domestic.

In the first quarter of the year, Z Battery deployed Observation Post parties on Ex FROZEN GUNNER in February to conclude the training of its OP Det 2IC course and facilitate the fires of the Regiment. Z Battery also successfully trained members of 1 RCHA on the Light Armoured Vehicle's 25mm Bushmaster as both gunners and crew commanders.

In the early summer months, Z Battery conducted Ex LETHAL OBSERVER which saw the Battery working with the RCMP Emergency Response Team to develop skills and TTPs for urban operations while also increasing the baseline urban fighting skills of its soldiers. The summer also brought personnel changes within the Battery, particularly the change of stick, in May, between outgoing BSM, WO Charette, and incoming BSM, WO Syme.

Early September provided excellent training opportunities to bolster the Z Battery Airborne capability. The members of G11 successfully completed two parachute descents with 3 PPCLI's Para Company. Z Battery began their training in September for Ex LIMBER GUNNER in October, where they provided both OP parties and JTACs to great effect. Ex LIMBER GUNNER gave Z Battery the opportunity to practice skills in trench clearing operations, use precision-guided munitions, and utilize Air OPs with support from 408 Tactical Helicopter Squadron out of CFB Edmonton.

The JTAC cell had a productive year with numerous challenging exercises both in Canada and abroad. The year started with the Regiment's JTACs deploying on Ex SHILO STRIKE in January followed by Ex MOODY STRIKE in Valdosta, Georgia, and Exercise EVERGLADE SUN in Avon Park, Florida, in March. In April, the JTAC cell supported the Advanced Tactical Aviation Course in Cold Lake with 3 PPCLI and 1 Wing RCAF. In the summer, the cell participated in Ex PRAIRIE THUNDER in Cold Lake and rounded out the summer in August with Ex ROLLING THUNDER which involved a maneuver exercise in Fort Riley, Kansas, coupled with a visit to the 69th and 23rd Bomb Squadrons of the USAF in North Dakota. Additionally, the Regiment deployed a JTAC to Op REASSURANCE in December to support 2 CMBG.

Upon the completion of yet another successful year, Z Battery looks forward to 2024 as they prepare for annual exercises and workup training for the next deployment cycle.

HQ & Svcs Battery

For Headquarters and Services (HQ & Svcs) Battery, 2023 was yet another busy year full of changes in personnel, deployments, and postings. The year started off with the change of command ceremony between outgoing Battery Commander, Major Telfer, and incoming Battery Commander, Major Little. In February, the Regiment conducted Ex FROZEN GUNNER with critical support from HQ & Svcs Battery to keep the regiment fighting. This year's exercise remains memorable to the Battery as it demonstrated its ability to provide support no matter what, even with minimal resources and personnel. HQ & Svcs Battery's focus during the spring was supporting the Regimental training cycle to help prepare the Regiment for upcoming deployments.

During this time, HQ & Svcs Battery saw another change in principle staff with the change of stick between outgoing Battery Sergeant Major, MWO Perrault, to incoming Battery Sergeant Major, MWO Fiander. HQ & Svcs Battery also welcomed a couple of new faces this year with the posting of a new Tech Adj, Capt Skvortsov, new QM, Capt Lee and Signals Officer, Capt Elliot, all of whom have been instrumental in supporting the Regiment in a variety of tasks and deployment. Together the Battery team, new and old, has continued to lead and administer the Battery and the Regiment in a way which has ensured continued success throughout the year.

HQ & Svcs Battery hit the ground running in the fall with Ex LIMBER GUN-



NER. It was the first time since the start of the COVID-19 pandemic that the whole Battery deployed to the field. During the exercise, the Battery focused on a deliberate deployment and the application of real-life support under tactical conditions. Adopting lessons learned from ongoing conflicts, HQ & Svcs Battery utilized a dispersed position and leveraged methods of communication that limited their electronic signature to minimize detection for potential OPFOR. HQ & Svcs Battery soldiers further honed their core soldier skills emphasising the importance of local defence and mastery of field craft. HQ & Svcs Battery's outstanding performance allowed them to transport over 2,000 rounds of 155mm, tens of thousand of small arms ammunition, and endless salvage. This all-hands-on-deck exercise can be described as an unquestionable success and allowed various key players to demonstrate their trades' specific skills and support, from Light Maintenance Troop's repair and recovery team, Signals Troop's unwavering flexibility and ability to maintain communication nodes, the Unit Medical Staff's outstanding medical support, and even spiritual support provided by the Regimental Padre.

During the winter of 2023, HQ & Svcs Battery recharged by executing the 1 RCHA 125th Anniversary Sports Day. Members of the Regiment participated in ball hockey, volleyball, soccer, and other activities. The festivities were followed by a barbeque to honour the 125th year of the Regiment. The 2nd Regiment, Royal Canadian Horse Artillery (2 RCHA) commenced 2023 in the CONTINGENCY phase of the Canadian Army Managed Readiness Plan, gearing up towards deploying in support of Canada's NATO remits and deployments in Eastern Europe and the Middle East before transitioning to the COMMITTED phase in July. Throughout 2023, 2 RCHA soldiers and officers conducted several field exercises, both within Canada and abroad, focusing on gunnery and integration of fires with other units, courses, sports and physical fitness competitions, professional development (PD), and ceremonial events. A key highlight of the year was the high level of excellence displayed by 2 RCHA's soldiers in deploying two batteries and other small parties to meet Canada's commitments internationally.

D Battery

D Battery had its sights set on its upcoming deployment to Op REASSURANCE and, as such, began the New Year with a great degree of emphasis placed on training and readiness. In January, D Battery conducted a dismounted small arms range focusing on fire and movement and working up to platoon attacks on multiple objectives. This demonstrated D Battery's capability to work as members of a formidable team in an unfamiliar context. From 6-9 March, D Battery conducted Ex FROZEN DRAGON. This provided the battery with an opportunity to practice critical skills and refine its winter tactics, techniques, and procedures in addition to building upon digital fires capabilities. The live-fire portion of the exercise was followed by a period of winter warfare training that qualified members of the battery as Cold Weather Operators.

While the BC and BSM attended the TAC Recce in Latvia with their advisors, D Battery was diligently working to complete collective training and IBTS with the 1 RCR, the Lead Mounting Unit for Op REASSURANCE R23-02. To declare the battery ready for deployment, the training included small arms ranges, LAV 6.0 ranges, some "enjoyable" time in the gas hut, and a collective level 6 live-fire range. Ex ROYAL DRAGON was the capstone exercise where D Battery fired live in support of 1 RCR platoon and company attacks.

May - June, D Battery enjoyed a period of leave prior to deploying to Lat-

via. Early in the deployment, the battery quickly integrated within the battle group and adapted to life in Camp Adazi. After a long, hot summer in the Latvian sun conducting multiple exercises, D Battery had completed offensive and defensive multinational exercises in support of combat teams from Canada, Spain, and Italy alongside artillery units from Spain, Slovenia, and Slovakia. From fire and movement to constructing trenches and gun pits by hand, every member of D Battery contributed immensely to the Combat Readiness Evaluation exercise, Ex SILVER ARROW 23. During Ex SILVER ARROW, D Battery showcased its lethality and exceptional work ethic by providing fire support to the battle group in support of its operations.



On 26 May 2023, 2 RCHA celebrated Artillery Day! The Regiment spent the morning outside competing in an inter-battery fitness challenge followed by a friendly sports tournament. To end this festive day, the 2 RCHA family came together and celebrated after with the traditional Artillery Day cake!

D Battery was steadfast in its commitment to excellence with ongoing dynamic ranges, and making the most of the time in theatre by maintaining and developing proficiency with small arms. After much planning, Ex WAWEL DRAGON was conducted in Poland, beginning with a road move from Camp Adazi through Lithuania to the destination in Poland. When D Battery arrived in Bemowo Piskie, they were welcomed by the members of Alpha "Aries" Battery, 4th Battalion, 27th Field Regiment as part of enhanced Forward Presence Battle Group (eFP BG) Poland and had the opportunity to meet and establish relationships with American, Croatian, and Romanian gunners. Prior to deploying to the field for a live shoot, D Battery had the privilege of attending a PD trip to Warsaw, Poland, where members were able to tour museums and experience Polish culture. During the live-fire portion of Ex WAWEL DRAGON,

D Battery sent bullets downrange from a massive three-battery gun position alongside the American and Croatian batteries. Battery members were able to watch the Romanian Air Defence unit fire live at Canadian illumination rounds, a rare experience that will not likely be forgotten. As R23-02 began to wind down, soldiers were poised to return to Petawawa and see their loved ones after a long six-month deployment.

The year brought a variety of challenges and obstacles for D Battery, but, at every turn, battery members surpassed expectations and once again demonstrated excellence, professionalism, and an unparalleled work ethic. Following a well-deserved post-deployment leave period, D Battery will be ready to face whatever 2024 brings.

E Battery

At the beginning of 2023, E Battery was quickly focussed on running



courses to prepare members for upcoming winter training and the future deployment on Op REASSURANCE R24-01. These included Gun Detachment Second-in-Command, a Gun Detachment Member, and Light Overland Snow Vehicle (Snowmobile).

Ex WINTER WARRIOR took place from 7-10 February that included Cold Weather Operator training for members of the battery. This exercise consisted of constructing improvised shelters, employing snares, ice fishing, and building snow defences then firing small arms at them to test their effectiveness. It aided in preparing members for Ex WINTER GUNNER that occurred from 21-24 February. This exercise included air mobile training in-conjunction with 450 Tactical Helicopter Squadron (THS) and was focused on conducting live-fire artillery training. During February, members of the battery were also course candidates on the LAV 6.0 Driver, TAPV Driver, and TAPV RWS courses. E Battery proudly participated in Ex OLYMPIAN BEAR. They assisted the regiment in providing a strong showing within the brigade.

Lieutenant Williamson, the Troop Commander of E Troop since September 2022, sadly passed away on 3 April. The Commanding Officer, Regimental Sergeant Major, and officers from the Regiment attended a celebration of life in his hometown of Hamilton, ON.

In the Spring, E Battery continued to run courses and complete troop-level training in preparation for upcoming PDT and IBTS training. E Battery soldiers attended Recce Tech, CP Tech, LAV 6.0 Gunner, and LAV 6.0 Crew Commander.

Troops of E Bty, 2 RCHA took part in Ex FROZEN GUNNER in collaboration with 450 THS to deploy their equipment and guns via a CH147 Chinook. Gunners braced the extreme cold to provide fire and effects on the ground as part of an all arms call for fire.



Members of E and Y Battery, who would deploy together as part of MEDUSA Battery in eFP BG R24-01, attended Ex FORMIDABLE SHIELD in May. Maj Hawke, Capt Cherry, MBdr Collins, and Bdr Orellana Menjivar travelled to the Cape Wrath Firing Range in the United Kingdom (UK) to conduct Naval Gunfire Support (NGS) training in a multi-national NATO setting. They called in and observed fires from the Italian, Spanish, and French navies involving guns ranging from 76mm to 5-inch. This training strengthened relations with the UK's NGS Training and Advisory team and set the groundwork to incorporate a Dutch Royal Marines Fire Support Team in Ex BLACK DAGGER.

D Troop ran Ex RAPID FIRE May, during which they conducted air mobile training with 450 THS, practiced basic section- and platoon-level patrol drills, completed night navigation and fieldcraft, and conducted a C6 weapons range. E Troop ran Ex GUNSLINGER in June that focussed on small party tasks and basic infantry skills. It included building map models, receiving and issuing orders, conducting day and night reconnaissance, and culminated with a tactical advance to battle and a team-building obstacle course. BHQ Troop ran Ex CHARGING GUNNER from 12-16 June; it had a primary focus of developing LAV 6.0 and TAPV driver and crew commander skills and a secondary focus of developing basic infantry skills. It included road moves, convoy drills, day/night navigation, and small party tasks, and it culminated with a deliberate section-level ambush supported by unmanned aerial systems with real-time enemy composition updates. This flurry of courses and training led to a quiet July allowing the battery to enjoy summer leave prior to a busy August filled with pre-deployment training.

In August E Battery focussed on the upcoming deployment on Op REASSURANCE R24-01. Ex READY SOLDIER ran in August and saw all types of IBTS training conducted. Following the exercise, focus was shifted to Ex BLACK DAGGER, which was split into two main phases: phase one was an artillery live-fire exercise and phase two shifted focus to dismounted infantry company training. Phase one focussed on fire and movement of the battery and included a PGK shoot, GPO open actions, HF tasks, air OPs, and a fire-planning portion. It was an excellent training opportunity that saw 1,100 rounds fired by the battery and saw two members of the regiment, Master Warrant Officer Herman and Warrant Officer Diaz, fire

their last rounds as part of a Departure with Dignity shoot. Phase two rapidly transitioned to dismounted infantry training. Orders were issued for an initial helicopter insertion in support of an urban assault on a built-up area, and, following a successful assault, platoon-level tasks continued that included dismounted patrols occurring throughout the area of operations and culminated with a company-level attack on an enemy platoon position. Throughout Ex BLACK DAGGER, support was provided by numerous outside units including 450 THS, 438 THS, 2 Combat Engineer Regiment, the Queen's York Rangers, and the Dutch Royal Marines.

In preparation for the upcoming deployment, the deploying members took an extended Thanksgiving leave and then soldiers of the battery's ATG travelled to Gagetown in October to participate in the 2 RCR's, level-4 training, and Ex VIRTUAL BEAR alongside members of the brigade.

The battery took pre-deployment leave in November, and by 16 December, all members of E Battery, now known as MEDUSA Battery while on Op REASSURANCE R24-01, had deployed.

December was a busy month on Op REASSURANCE. DRAGON "D" Battery provided a comprehensive handover that allowed MEDUSA "E" Battery to quickly take the reins. Focus was immediately placed on preparing for Exercises that were scheduled to take place in early 2024. Spending the holidays and Christmas away is always hard, but members of the battery enjoyed a Troop Appreciation Dinner, had the opportunity to attend a local Christmas market, and spent time calling family and friends back home.

F Battery

F Battery had a demanding, yet successful, year focussed on supporting 2 RCHA commitments to Op REASSURANCE and sustaining the DART. Multiple other exercises and courses were organized and externally supported to ensure that F Battery personnel remained prepared and technically proficient.

At the beginning of the year, F Battery conducted its winter training in the Petawawa training area to ensure member readiness for operating in cold, austere environments and to develop team cohesion. The focus was on snowshoeing, cross-country skiing, and improvised shelter construction. Once the training aims were achieved, members redeployed from the training to begin taking on the battery's new secondary duty as DART's Defense and Security Platoon.

F Battery members were deployed around Canada and abroad to assume DART duties from D Battery, support national-level courses, and support Op REASSURANCE. F Battery soldiers stood up to support possible missions to Turkey, Egypt, and the UK, providing the Canadian government with immediate and timely options in the face of external pressures.

Upon returning from summer block leave, F Battery conducted simultaneous battery-level training events and courses and provided members for Ex VIRTUAL BEAR. The battery conducted an Armored Vehicle Crew Commander course and a Bison Conversion course and sent members to assist with PLQ courses. F Battery conducted an escape and evasion exercise in conjunction with the Peel Region Police and 450 THS. It also conducted a successful airborne manoeuvre out to the Petawawa training area and worked with ground force elements to send out the battery escape parties. F Battery's contribution was proceeding well but was canceled early due to a training accident involving 450 THS. The members of F Battery were pulled back in and put on standby for assistance, in the situation that they would be called on to provide support in the immediate aftermath.

The battery conducted two technical confirmation exercises, verifying proficiency with integral equipment and basic soldiering skills in coordination with 30th and 42nd Field Artillery Regiments. Ex RADIATING FOX prioritized the employment of the LCMR and evaluated our members on reconnaissance, reports and returns, indirect fire detections, and coordination with friendly forces. The battery was given a well-deserved long weekend before re-deploying to the field for Ex LETHAL FOX. The priority was the employment of the AWLS, local defense, and CP rhythm in relation to indirect fire detections. Concurrently, F Battery sent two Intelligence, Surveillance, Target Acquisition, and Reconnaissance teams in support of Ex VIRTUAL BEAR to Gagetown while maintaining one in Petawawa. These teams were invaluable to the successful conduct of the exercise and increased brigade interoperability between units and assets.

F Battery entered the Christmas leave period fatigued but satisfied with the accomplishments of the year. F Battery will return in 2024 ready to face a new set of challenges in support of 2 CMBG.

Y Battery

Y Battery began 2023 with momentum from the previous year and a focus on readiness to achieve operational commitments and enhancing warfighting capabilities. In January, Y Battery conducted PCF courses and CWO training. The LAV 6.0 course kicked off as the first course of many for the year, and, in February, the battery participated in Ex FRIGID OBSERVER. Concurrently, Y Battery JTACs maintained a continuous training tempo with several exercises to achieve currency and proficiency training. They began the year with Ex SHILO STRIKE and Ex CURRENT RAPTOR to begin qualification upgrades (QUA) to increase operational capabilities.

March and April involved critical JTAC training events including training in Avon Park, Florida, with 3rd Air Support Operations Group. It was a JTAC/CAS exercise focused on training participants to execute Joint Fires in large-scale combat operations and counterinsurgency operations in a high-threat combat environment and to develop trained and proficient war fighting professionals. The exercise also focused on conducting QUA and currency with exposure to various platforms and to establish and improve working relationships with key partners. In April, Ex PALE HORSE in Fort Drum, New York, re-established a working relationship with 20th Air Support Operation Squadron (20th ASOS) and focused on achieving the currency requirement for two deploying JTACs on Op REASSURANCE R23-02. Additionally, in the same month, Warrant Officer Griffiths and Captain Simonds deployed in support of Op SAVANNE, a 3 RCR non-combatant evacuation operation in Sudan.

Y Battery conducted an OPVCC course in May, and, in June, members of Y Battery deployed alongside D Battery for the first of two operational

commitments to Op REASSURANCE in Latvia. Pre-JTAC was also conducted in June, and participants from the Infantry School, Tactical Air Control Party, and 2 RCHA executed a ground school and air phase in Petawawa, supported by Lear jets and Alpha jets.

After a well-deserved period of summer leave, Y Battery returned to participate in IBTS training events and conducted several courses including another LAV 6.0 Driver and the gun camp for the year's earlier OPVCC, all of which increased readiness within the battery.

Y Battery conducted a change of command in August with Major Neeley as the new Battery Commander and Warrant Officer Barney as the new Battery Sergeant Major. With conditions set to support operational commitments, Y Battery developed and implemented a PD program which included several presentations on NGS. Further PD was conducted with a trip to Ottawa to visit the Canadian War Museum and to improve mental resiliency and team cohesion. Y Battery's soldier skills were honed during Ex LETHAL FOX, a pairs- and section-level live-fire range with F Battery, and during urban operations training with 3 RCR. JTACs continued training on several exercises including a combined event in Cold Lake, AB, which included JTACs from all three brigades and 20th ASOS, and focused on sharing common standard operating procedures and tactics, techniques, and procedures. In December, Y Battery again deployed some of its members to Op REASSURANCE R24-01 alongside E Battery and welcomed back those returning from the summer rotation.

This year was busy and rewarding for the members of Y Battery. Now the focus is entirely on the next bound – the BUILD year towards a renewed

COMMITTED year in 2025. The goal: forging leaner, more lethal, fire supporters who are prepared to deliver decisive effects on time and on target in 2024 and beyond.

Headquarters and Services Battery

Headquarters and Services (HQ) Battery had a busy year full of change along with the rest of the Regiment. Significant leadership changes were made this year with Master Warrant Officer Herman handing over the Battery Sergeant Major position to Master Warrant Officer Normand. Master Warrant Officer Herman, after many exemplary years of service within the regiment, has now retired. Major Haynes handed the Battery Commander position over to Major Wilson. Major Haynes deployed on Op IMPACT and returned to the regiment, taking over the role of deputy commanding officer from Major Kelly.

HQ Battery maintained its high standard of support to all 2 RCHA tasks. In late summer, the battery supported E Battery's pre-deployment training exercise, Ex BLACK DAGGER. Throughout the regimental school, HQ Battery provided support to numerous PCF courses. Furthermore, HQ Battery planned and executed this year's IRON WARRIOR challenge, staffing the command post and a variety of different stations throughout the race.

HQ Battery continued its hard work through the fall training cycle, ensuring vehicles and equipment were made available for several courses, including Bison Driver, MSVS SMP, and LHS. Later in the year, the battery enabled the conduct of numerous PCF courses, which ensured the readiness of 2 RCHA for the upcoming year and set the conditions for operational deployments. In addition to the work done by the battery to support the regiment and brigade, HQ Battery participated heavily in Ex VIRTUAL BEAR, acting as LOCON in Petawawa with a contingent acting as 0 and 95 in Gagetown. During the exercise, HQ Battery provided crucial combat service support to other units within the brigade and ensured the battery was prepared for future deployments.

After balancing a year of postings, position changes, and training exercises, the personnel employed in HQ Battery have performed over and above all expectations, ensuring that 2 RCHA is properly supported and prepared for the challenges that await the regiment in 2024.

Conclusion

2 RCHA happily concluded 2023 with festive activities such as the Saint Barbara's Day Ball and Sports Day. The members of 2 RCHA enjoyed their holiday leave returning rejuvenated for 2024, which promises to be an exceptionally busy year. In 2024, 2 RCHA will conclude the COMMITTED phase before transitioning back to the BUILD phase in July in preparation to meet the new Canadian Army Managed Readiness Plan's COMMITTED to NATO phase in July 2025. While much of the regiment will still be deployed on expeditionary operations for half of the year, the members remaining in Canada will remain poised to respond to any DART activations and support to Op LENTUS as needed. As always, 2 RCHA's personnel will continue to hone their skills and continue supporting 2 CMBG to an exceptional standard.

BATTERIE Q

Pour la bie Q, l'année 2023 aura été marquée par le rythme de bataille de montée en puissance avec l'Ex JRTC, qui était en cours en Louisiane, fournissant le support MUAS au 3^e R22R. Cette année aura été chargée avec la mise à jour des compétences des membres à travers divers exercices ainsi que la reprise de l'École Régimentaire. La bie Q a été fidèle à elle-même et a su rencontrer tous les défis que l'année lui a apporté.

De nombreux changements aux postes de commandement de la bie ont marqué la dernière année. L'Adjum Morin a remplacé l'Adjum Leblanc dans le poste de SMB. BATTERIE V

Un horaire d'entraînement serré culmina avec notre participation à l'Ex MAPLE RESOLVE. Depuis l'automne, la bie V se prépare en vue du déploiement imminent sur Op RÉASSURANCE à l'été 2024.

Le 17 juillet 2023, le Maj J.F. Lee est devenu le nouveau Commandant de bie, remplaçant le Maj J.M.J.D. Daigle.

L'été 2023 a été marqué par l'Op LENTUS. La bie V a contribué aux efforts en prêtant main-forte aux bies du régiment et aux unités externes, en déployant leur personnel pour renforcer les effectifs. Les membres ont principalement été déployés dans les municipalités de Chibougamau, suivi de Sept-Îles. Par la suite, l'expertise de la bie V en matière d'application et d'intégration de l'appui-feu a été sollicitée en soutien à Op NEO (Non-combatant Evacuation OPERATIONS) avec l'Op LUMEN du 14 septembre au 26 novembre 2023, une tâche qui aurait pu évoluer rapidement en raison du conflit en Israël.

La bie V a participé à divers exercices pour l'année 2023, commençant en hiver avec le soutien à l'entraînement du 3^e R22R au JRTC (Joint Readiness Training Center) en Louisiane, aux États-Unis. Les JTAC (Joint Terminal Attack Controller) ont également dirigé les exercices CURRENT RAPTOR 2301 à Valcartier et Bagotville, et SMOKY RAP-

TOR 2301 au Kansas durant la même période. Au printemps, la bie a ensuite participé à la confirmation de la brigade à l'Ex MAPLE RESOLVE et l'Ex REFLEX RAPIDE 2023. À la suite de l'Op LENTUS et des congés d'été, l'entraînement a repris en force : les JTAC ont dirigé l'Ex CURRENT RAPTOR 2302 avec la participation au niveau national et des invités du programme JTAC français. La bie a participé à l'exercice régimentaire PIÈCES AGUERIES 2023 avec pour objectif

l'observation des feux et l'intégration du soutien aérien rapproché dans le plan d'appui-feu. Les JTAC du 5 RALC ont clôturé l'année d'entraînement collectif avec la planification et l'exécution de l'Ex RAPTOR STRIKE, le premier exercice international de soutien aérien rapproché à grande échelle au Canada depuis mai 2021.

En soutien à l'école régimentaire, la bie V a mené plusieurs cours au courant de la dernière année : un cours de canonier 25 mm VBL 6.0, un cours de pré-JTAC, un cours de conducteur VBL 6.0, un cours de membre de détachement de poste d'observation et, pour finir, un cours de tir au canon de 25 mm par le chef de char sur le VBL 6.0.

BATTERIE R

The 4th Artillery Regiment (General Support) (4 Regt (GS)) provides critical warfighting capabilities to the CA and the CAF as part of the 6 Canadian Combat Support Brigade (CCSB). It is a unique unit and unlike any other artillery unit within the Canadian Armed Forces. 4 Regt (GS) provides four critical capabilities to the CA and CAF as a whole: the Medium Range Radar (MRR); the CU172 Blackjack Small Unmanned Aerial System (SUAS); the provision of Tactical Data Links (TDL); and divisional-level coordination.

The MRR provides air surveillance against enemy aircraft locally while also contributing to the Recognized Air Picture. Additionally, the MRR enables counterfires through the detection of hostile artillery and rockets.

The CU172 Blackjack provides real-time answers to critical questions posed by Commanders. Capable of extended range operations by day and night, the Blackjack enables target acquisition throughout the battle space.

To incorporate the effects and capabilities of the MRR and CU172 Blackjack, the Air Defense Cell (ADC) provides the connectivity to formation headquarters using TDL. By collecting and combining the feed from the regimental sensors, the ADC builds the Local Air Picture that is pushed higher to the Recognized Air Picture, thus providing early warning against threats while also coordinating ground-based air defense.

Finally, the Regiment enables warfighting operations within the 1st Canadian Division Headquarters through the provision of coordination centres focused on Fires Support (FSCC), Air Defence (Div ADC), and Surveillance and Target Acquisition (STACC).

Overview

2023 built on the momentum that was seen in 2022. Each sub-unit saw continued growth in both personnel and capabilities, which further validated the BTS that we are charged with maintaining. Past years have seen 4 Regt (GS) busy with the tasks that come with being the IRU, but this year saw a surge in participation in exercises at all levels, be they domestic, international, or virtual.

Further focus on the skills of each sub-unit and the capabilities each provides gave opportunities to see many members deployed in their unique and specialist roles. While these deployments and operations are not expected to go away for 2024, the effort members are making is in preparation for the first large scale deployments for the unit since the days of Afghanistan. Looking ahead, it is expected that the tempo will continue to increase, placing strain on our soldiers at all levels, but, thanks to the training of the past year, our troops will bend but not break under the future stressors that Canada demands of them.


This year has seen changes in the leadership across the unit to include:

In addition to members being promoted, there were many deserving members within the unit who were awarded medals and commendations. In total, 21 received their CD and four received their CD1; two General Campaign Stars were awarded with one 1st rotation bar for the same; one OSM Expedition was awarded; one American Joint Service Commendation Medal; and 18 pers received the Queen's Platinum Jubilee Medal. Other commendations included one Comd CADTC Commendation, two 6 CCSB Commendation Coins, two 5 Div Commendation Coins, and one King's Coronation Coin.



Even with the joy that came with these deserving promotions and awards, unfortunate incidents created a saddened atmosphere in the unit. S1 L.S. Roy passed away 26 March 2023, and, just prior to being posted into the unit, 2Lt G.U. Kasheke passed away 6 May 2023. Many from of the unit attended the funerals for both, and it is the hope that the two of them would both be proud of the many accomplishments of the members of their Regimental Family over the past year.

127 BATTERY

2023 was a busy year for 127 Battery (127 Bty) as we saw a change of appointment of the BSM, were redesignated from a GS Battery to an Air Defense Battery and stood up two troops of VSHORAD (Very Short-Range Air Defence) operators to train to meet the incoming capabilities. The Battery redesignation was a significant event in which a parade was held in the Gagetown Training Area and attended by the 6 CCSB Commander, Commanding Officers from several units throughout the country and many distinguished guests. 127 Bty also continues to develop its capability in the role of the AD sub-unit of 4 Regt (GS). The Bty increased the operational tempo and focussed the training for its members. Through unity of effort within the ADC and TDL community, 127 Bty was able to support international deployments, national courses, and collective training throughout Canada.

During 2023, members of 127 Bty provided airspace coordination, management, and TDL expertise to the Latvian Mechanized Infantry Brigade on Op REASSURANCE. During the different iterations of the Integrated Capstone Exercises, members deployed on Op REASSURANCE, aided in the management of the Latvian Brigade's airspace, as well as helped maintain situational awareness on friendly AD assets within the region.

Throughout the year, 127 Bty pushed the Regiment's capabilities towards the modern battlespace. Members participated in a multitude of joint exercises such as Ex VIRTUAL FLAG COALITION, Ex CUTLESS FURY, and Ex BOLD QUEST. These exercises demonstrated the necessity for our cooperation and coordination with our allies and the value we added with our AD and airspace coordination background. Ex GOLD GUNNER (4 Regt (GS) lead) was a Regimental exercise testing the Composite GS Battery and the ADC.

With the GBAD Project underway, and the UOR for VSHORAD as part of the eFP Brigade coming to Latvia, 127 Bty conducted Ex URSUS ETERNAL and Ex SATURATED GUNNER which prepared 127 Bty for increased operational tempo and receipt of their VSHORAD capabilities. The culmination of these exercises was the support given to the Air Defense Officer's course field training exercise, Ex URSUS PRIME, which included the employment of an AD CP and the deployment of GBAD detachments. The ever-approaching arrival of the VSHORAD capability has inspired 127 Bty to become a respected and exceptional partner on the international stage.

128 BATTERY

128 Bty continued to build upon the momentum of the previous year. Two Det member courses, four combat first aid courses, two TAPV RWS courses with an RWS range, and an iteration of the Gunner Junior Leadership Course. With an average of three events or courses in a month, 128 Bty's tempo remained high, testing not only their unique capabilities but

the resiliency of their people.

128 Bty ran several back-to-back exercises through the summer and into fall, showcasing the skill and proficiency of its members. Exercises DYNAMIC JAVELIN, SCREENING JAVELIN, CUTLASS FURY, BOLD QUEST, and FORCEFUL JAVELIN put members of 128 through their paces and validating BTS level 3 during both DYNAMIC JAVELIN and FORCEFUL JAVELIN. Ex BOLD QUEST took place in Denmark and provided an excellent opportunity for members to operate in an international context and to demonstrate the skills and the value that 128 Bty can bring to our NATO allies.

The Bty led the "Way to Hell Challenge" for the Regiment, offering a competitive version and a completionist version. Members were put through various challenges that tested their physical strength and endurance, communication between team members, reconnaissance skills, and marksmanship. 11 teams took part with first place being claimed by MBdr Churchill, MBdr Greer, MBdr O'Dell, and Bdr White.

129 BATTERY

129 Bty had a very significant year. After having the CU-172 Blackjack for the past 5 years, the Bty at long last reached its Full Operational Capability (FOC). This milestone was marked on the flight line during the flight camp for a SUAS Det Member Course in April and included a small ceremony. All qualified Operators also received their individual call signs. To make this achievement even more special, a recce was conducted in Latvia in preparation for upcoming deployments tentatively expected to start in 2024.

The Bty ran several courses including the previously mentioned SUAS Det Member, AVCC, SUAS Det Commander, Level B weapon system release training for Det Commanders, and OEM training. All members of the Bty, from operators to maintainers, were kept busy in support of all these efforts, using Ex MOJAVE GAMBLER as the motivator.

The Bty took part in several exercises with very different goals. Ex GOLD GUNNER was a Regimental effort that had 129 Bty work more closely with the unit's other sense and (upcoming) strike capabilities. Ex FLYING GUARDIAN was used to qualify and validate the training of new Det Commanders. Finally, Ex MOJAVE GAMBLER, took place in California over a 5-week period. While down there, the Bty achieved BTS level 4, logged over 260 flight hours, maintained two lines of tasks to conduct 24 hour operations, and witnessed the first member to personally reach 100 flight hours. This historic exercise built on the hard work conducted in the previous year and would not have been possible without the effort and drive of all members of the Bty, both on Ex and back home.

HQ & SVCS BATTERY

2023 proved to be another busy year for HQ & Svcs Bty. During the month of May, HQ & Svcs Bty provided CSS and real-time support for Ex GOLD GUNNER, assisting the Composite AD Bty in the successful completion of their confirmation exercise. Maintenance Troop provided a full echelon with a team on call to provide a Mobile Repair Team (MRT) support to the AD Bty while CS 8 maintained communications throughout the RTA to the dispersed Troops. Log Troop conducted Delivery Points (DPs) with the AD Bty for all necessary equipment to accomplish their training, and, throughout Ex GOLD GUNNER, the Cooks section continued to run their MKT.

During the month of September, HQ & Svcs Bty was prepared to support 4 ESR's contribution to Op LENTUS during the potential call-out for Hurricane Lee.

HQ & Svcs Bty participated in Ex ROCK STEADY GUNNER in October. During this exercise, members of the Bty were able to recertify in all IBTS requirements.

Throughout the Fall, HQ & Svcs Bty worked extended hours to reduce the maintenance backlog and VOR rate, improve our materiel accountability, and further signals connectivity initiatives. Maint Tp executed a move to different working areas with Sigs Tp to improve future work requirements. The Bty also found the time to support the United Way Campaign through various initiatives.

At the end of another hectic training year, the Bty transitioned into "Silly Season" which was kicked off with the Saint Barbara's Sports Day and finished with the Regt Soldiers' Appreciation Dinner. HQ & Svcs Bty entered the Holiday Season with their heads held high for all their accom-

plishments over the year, and for knowing they are well-postured to continue their hard work into 2024.

CONCLUSION

4 Regt (GS) concluded 2023 with the annual St. Barbara's Day sports-day and a mess dinner with the RCAS. It was an opportunity to continue

fostering growth between our two local units while encouraging the friendly competition that members from both units look forward to each year.

We were given the opportunity to not only recharge with our families during the holiday leave period, but also reflect on the accomplishments of the past year. All members of 4 Regt (GS) worked tirelessly to earn their well-deserved time off. The coming year will provide its own challenges, some familiar and some foreign, though, through it all, we will meet any adversity head on and with the ferocity the Fighting Fourth has earned.

In 2023, The Royal Regiment of Canadian Artillery School (RCAS) maintained its commitment and adaptive capabilities with respect to modernizing the Artillery as we continue to shift into the digital age. The RCAS, with its Batteries and supporting training cells, commendably achieved required training requirements of the RCA while deploying personnel in support of Op UNIFIER. Simultaneously, we reviewed and amended the training modules and instructing methods to meet the needs and advancements of the CAF and the evolving battlespace.

W Bty provided supporting fires to all RCAS courses to ensure maximum realistic effects. The focus, as always, was on providing highly-trained and skilled soldiers to the field force units to meet current and future requirements of the RCA. Headquarters Battery continued to support course efforts while facilitating the welfare of young soldiers awaiting training. 67 Bty continued to deliver high-quality training both in garrison and in the field. The battery trained future Gunnery on DP1 courses as well as Senior NCOs and Officers on DP2 Gunline and Observer courses. The Instructors-in-Gunnery (IG) and Assistant Instructors-in-Gunnery (AIG) provided expert tactical and technical knowledge and guided their students to success. We initiated our first serials of the new DP1.1 Artillery Officer Course and prepared ourselves for the new DP1.2 Artillery Officer Course in the near future. 45 Battery continued to develop their JTAC programs with courses and taskings around the world. The Ground-Based Air Defence (GBAD) Team is focused on preparing for future air defence capabilities. This year, the emphasis for the unit has been on building partnerships and working towards developing the best Gunnery possible.

The RCAS also changed command from LCol J.A. Phillips to LCol Y.J.G.-E.N. Leclerc-Desjardins. Additionally, we marked the change of appointment between the former RCAS RSM, now Capt D.M.J. Munro, and current RSM, CWO J.F. Latulippe.

Our team has gone above and beyond the call of duty to provide fires on-time and on-target.

Chief Instructor-in-Gunnery (CIG) Cell

During the previous year, the CIG team focused its support on Canadian Army Modernization and Op REASSURANCE planning. The former CIG, Maj Kevan Currie, transferred to the ARes, was promoted to LCol, and took command of 3rd Field Artillery Regiment, RCA, making way for Maj Keith Woodill to return as the CIG. Capt Jason Ladouceur also transferred to the ARes and rejoined the team as a contractor, joining Capts Barski,

Fraser, Sirio, Conley, and Murney, MWO Noel, and WOs Dalton and Keenan on the RCA FCOE / capability development team. The CIG team also added Andre LaHaye as a contractor.

On the capability development front, there are currently more than 15 major capital projects and urgent operational requirements that directly affect the RCA, and the CIG team has been heavily involved in each of them. There is a bright future ahead for the RCA with respect to CAF acquisition of equipment, and the team is heavily involved in ensuring that equipment is well integrated into the RCA.

The CIG team also assisted the Canadian Army's establishment of a Multi-National

Brigade in Latvia as part of Op REASSURANCE. This Brigade will include an Artillery Battalion Group which was designed in part by the CIG team. The sustainment and development of this organization will be closely monitored by the CIG team moving forward.

The CIG cell achieved some success with new digital communication technologies. The digitization team led the roll-out of the newest version of the CA fire control software (FATES 4.0) which will greatly enable digital communications from the detachment-level to the division-level. The next year will see continued development of this software with the MRR in support of CAXs at the RCAS and on Op REASSURANCE.

Headquarters Battery (HQ Bty)

Throughout the year, HQ Bty provided dedicated service and support to all

courses. HQ Bty personnel encountered and overcame considerable challenges this year, including staffing shortfalls, vehicle and equipment shortages, and the management of hundreds of candidates travelling to and from 5 CDSB Gagetown for training at the RCAS. Thanks to the dedication and professionalism of HQ Bty personnel, individual training and the production of qualified NCMs and officers continued, ensuring support to the field force had been maintained. HQ Bty managed RCAS vehicles and stores, deployed elements to the field directly in support of training exercises, and managed hundreds of soldiers eagerly awaiting the start of their career in the CAF.

Significant events for HQ Bty this year included MWO P.R. Turner passing the Battery Sergeant-Major's pace stick to MWO D.R. Evans. As well, Maj J.L. McGregor, BC HQ Bty, completed a three-month deployment to Latvia in support of Op UNIFIER as the Senior Artillery Advisor to the Leadership Training & Development Establishment.

67th Depot Battery (67 Bty)

In 2023, 67 Bty continued to deliver high-quality training both in garrison and in the field. The Battery trained future Gunners and Gunner Officers of The Royal Regiment of Canadian Artillery on DP1 courses as well as Senior NCO and Officers on DP 2 gunline and Observer courses. The Bty successfully ran the following courses: 3x RQ 1, 3x DP 1.1 Regular Force, 1x DP 1.1 ARes, 1x GATSM course, 1x FOO, 1x OPDC, 1x FSCC WO, and 3x DP 1.2.

The Bty was fortunate to send a few of its members on operations in 2023 to gain 'real-world' experience. Sgt Rouselle deployed on Op UNIFIER while Sgt Dawson and Capt Nettie both deployed on Op REASSURANCE. Another opportunity to gain experience occurred when the Bty supported 38 Artillery Tactical Group in Shilo with AIG assistance.

New IGs and AIGs arrived in the Bty after the completion of their demanding courses. The Bty was proud to have MWO Houle and MWO Doucet promoted to their current rank and bid farewell to many of the previous batch of instructors as they moved on. At the end of June, the change of command between Maj A.N. Holleran and Maj R.T.P. Turner took place with MWO J. Kaus maintaining steadfast leadership in the position as BSM.

45 Depot Bty (45 Bty)

STA

The final iteration of the former STA Officer course was conducted in the summer, and the cell now looks forward to supporting future STA officer training as part of the new DP1.2 model. In the fall, members of the cell took part in a familiarization exercise with DLR 2 utilizing General-Purpose Uncrewed Aerial System (GPUAS). Late in the year, the cell delivered the STA Technical Supervisor Course. Detachment Commander Courses for Acoustic Weapon Locating System (AWLS) and Mini Uncrewed Aerial System (MUAS) were run at Close Support Regiments. This winter will see the second iteration of a revamped STA TSM course which includes planning ACOM with students from the Artillery Operations Course and culminates in a live-fire troop defense. Captain Vendette and WO Burke were recognized with Commandants Coins for their development of an 'STA Range Arm' that can be utilized on operations. Captain Vendette and WO Sheppard skillfully conducted an IG assist in 29 Palms, California, in support of 4th Regiment (General Support) pre-deployment training. As overseas commitments and training demands increase, the cell anticipates another busy year in 2024.

Joint Terminal Attack Controller (JTAC) Cell

The RCAS JTAC Cell continued to conduct JTAC individual training on behalf of the Canadian Army. After managing the cell for the past 2 years, Major Vanthournout was promoted to their current rank and posted to Ottawa. ASI JTAC, WO Tribe, was posted to 4 Regt to continue their career as the unit Trg WO.

The year began with support to the CTAT-J Mobile Trainer Team with 3 JTAC-Instructors (JTAC-I) supporting the Jordanian Air Force (JAF) JTAC course. The cell conducted the JTAC course in Fall 2023 which was split between Canada and the US with crucial support from the United States Air Force. In November, the cell provided a JTAC-I to support the United Kingdom JTAC re-accreditation, representing the Canadian JTAC program internationally. When not teaching courses or supporting operations, the JTAC cell provided necessary augmentation to the RCAS with specialists for the Artillery Operations course, the Air Defence Officer course, and

many others. They ended the year with a total rewrite of the JTAC-I course to ensure that the RCA continues to deliver a relevant capability to the CA.

The JTAC capability continued to face many internal pressures affecting IT delivery; however, 2024 promises delivery of a JTAC simulator which will decrease the requirement for foreign assistance. Despite these challenges, the cell remains dedicated to maintaining and enhancing the Close Air Support (CAS) capability into the future.

Air Defence

The AD Cell was busy throughout the year qualifying personnel and fulfilling COE requirements. Capt Beaulieu-Labonte and WO Hoquet joined the AD Cell after completing the Gunnery Staff Course in the United Kingdom, while both Capt Sirio and WO Levesque moved out of the AD Cell and onto other endeavors. Nevertheless, training moved at an accelerated pace in anticipation of 4 Regt's AD deployments on Op REASSURANCE. Significant time and effort were spent running two Air Defence Officer Courses, one in the Spring and a second in the Fall. These courses proved challenging for many students, but, with excellent instruction and drive from the candidates, the AD Cell qualified twelve new AD officers. In July, the AD Cell ran an AD Detachment Commander Training Program to provide Detachment Commanders from 4 Regt with a professional development opportunity so that they could effectively support RCAS courses. The AD Cell also participated in the AD Technical Supervisor QS/TP Writing Board with this work continuing into 2024. 45 Bty BK, Capt Carnegie, continued to develop the Canadian Army's TDL capability. Finally, the AD Cell fulfilled numerous other responsibilities such as instruction on the AIG Course, support to the Artillery Operations Course, and AD advisory in several capacities including support to DLR.

GBAD Implementation Team

The GBAD team is currently under the leadership of Maj Cusson, Capt Weaver, and WO St-Hilaire. The role of the GBAD team is to help facilitate the direction of the GBAD project on the behalf of the Director of Artillery. Working with the Director of Land Force Development, the Canadian Army Land Warfare Centre, and the Director Land Requirements, the GBAD team provided subject matter expertise and advice to various working groups throughout the year as part of the efforts to reintroduce a GBAD capability back into the Canadian Armed Forces (CAF). The team spent this past year attending numerous events across Canada and abroad to see the development of future GBAD systems being considered for the CAF. The team has been especially busy with the new Urgent Operational Requirement for a Soldier Portable Air Defense System (SPAD) and aim to have something ready and in the hands of soldiers by 2024.

Advanced Training (Adv Trg) Cell

In early 2023, Adv Trg conducted the Artillery Operations Officer course, qualifying over twenty artillery officers at DP 2 level. Students of all specialties were pushed out of their comfort zone and tested through demanding OPP cycles focused on the planning and execution of operations of a Fire Support Coordination Centre (FSCC), surveillance And Target Acquisition Coordination Centre (STACC), and Air Space Coordination Centre (ASCC). The Artillery Operations Officer course was followed shortly thereafter by the DP 3 BC course. This course trained future BCs on their roles and responsibilities while commanding a battery, whether that be a gun, observation post (OP), STA, air defence (AD), or HQ Battery. The final, technically driven, fire planning exercise was conducted solely through simulation at the RCAS. This allowed unique opportunities for the BC students to exercise their fire support planning skills in ways that are not always possible when conducting live exercises, such as in support of counter-battery operations. The IG students completed both courses as part of their training.

In the same timeframe, the AIG course entered the second phase of their year-long training where they became student-mentors and employed as course programmers and instructors on RCAS national courses to both challenge and build their instructional skills. In April, the AIG students completed the training required to receive their Battery Sergeant Major (BSM) qualifications. Adv Trg personnel participated in a foreign visit which included visits to and briefs at The Royal School of Artillery (RSA) in the United Kingdom, the NATO Supreme Headquarters Allied Powers Europe (SHAPE) in Belgium, and the NATO Air Command (AIRCOM) in Germany. The IG and AIG students graduated on 26 May 2023 and immediately began employment within their respective training Batteries.

In July, the national BSM course was conducted a second time at CFB



Gagetown with Maj Brown and WO Thordarson in charge of qualifying future NCO command leadership. Once the course was complete, WO Balicki assumed responsibility as the Adv Trg Sergeant Major (SM) from WO Thordarson. On 24 July 2023, six new IG and eleven new AIG students arrived to begin their training to become the next generation of RCAS instructors. The IG course, led by Capt Staples and Capt Brook, created challenges that were designed to test the students' capabilities while honing their skills as both instructors and educators. The AIGs were instructed by their course officer Capt Comeau and their respective mentors on becoming technical artillery experts. The IG and AIG courses combined several classes to enhance the learning and understanding for all students. These courses included numerous field and simulation training events whose success was largely due to the steadfast efforts of both course programmers, WO Rogerson and WO Caron. These course programmers were able to integrate the Adv Trg courses into other RCAS training activities which allowed the IG and AIG students to practice their instructional techniques with real students, while still under the supervision of their course staff.

In November, the IG and AIG courses combined again to concentrate on learning about ammunition, equipment, digital fires, and the duties of the Regimental Command Post (RCP). Exercises TOTAL CONTROL and TOTAL VICTORY were multi-Battery exercises involving 1st and 3rd Field Artillery Regiments and 6e Régiment d'artillerie de campagne and were completed successfully over two weekends. Throughout the IG and AIG courses, individuals were continuously evaluated on their instructional techniques, worked on course projects, and studied for their numerous artillery related evaluations. Prior to the winter holidays, Sgt Pitman was promoted to the rank of Warrant Officer and Capt Staples received a CADTC commendation based on their exceptional contribution to their students and the RCAS as an instructor. The IG and AIG courses will continue their tradition of publishing articles relevant to artillery evolution through the Long Course Journal with the intent to foster discussion within the greater artillery community.

W Battery

W Battery was busy through 2023 supporting RQ1 Artillery Detachment

Member Common, DP1.1 & 1.2 Artillery Troop Commander, DP2 FOO, STA Officer, STA Tech and Tech Supervisor, AD Officer, Gun Area Technical Supervisor, Gun Area TSM, OP Det Commander, IG/AIG, Artillery Operations, and Battery Commander's courses.

W Battery also conducted a wide range of PCF training to adapt to the new RQ1 model and to maintain the ability to provide support to National Training. W Battery's soldiers gained qualifications for FOO, C3, LG1, OP Detachment Members, Arty Communicator, CP Tech, and Recce Tech. Members were also qualified on the various vehicle fleets.

During the summer, the W Battery command team changed from Maj J.M. Gargano and MWO J.W. Simpson to the command team of Maj D. Kapa and MWO F.J.M. Houle.

W Battery formally recognized several of their members for their hard work and dedication throughout the year. WO Rein, Sgt Lachance-Quessy, and Sgt Sevigny each received the Cmdt Coin. Bdr Goulding was awarded the RCAS Soldier of the Year while Capt Leong and WO Rein were recognized as W Battery's Top TC and TSM. Two of the battery's members were also fortunate to get the opportunity to deploy. Sgt Guinet was deployed in support of Op REASSURANCE while Sgt Rousselle was deployed in support of Op UNIFIER.

As the RCA continues to mould the Officer and NCM training model to adapt to the everchanging requirements, W Battery will continue to be there to support in whatever capacity required with the goal of delivering of high-calibre training and developing the soldiers and leaders of tomorrow.

Conclusion

Over the past year, the RCAS has trained hundreds of soldiers across a broad spectrum of specialities while simultaneously preparing for the future requirements of The Royal Regiment of Canadian Artillery. We have streamlined and improved the process to keep up with the ever-changing demand of Individual Training while developing the soldiers and leaders of the next generation. Following a well-deserved winter break, we are ready for 2024 and the challenges it will bring. UBIQUE!



Exercises



In 2023, the 5th (British Columbia) Field Artillery Regiment, RCA (5 Fd), continued to build with the continuation of normal training and events. Assistance was provided to domestic operations within the province of British Columbia during the hot summer fire season, and individual deployments across the country and around the world were undertaken by individual members. Recruiting numbers for both the Battery and the Band increased from the previous year. Live-fire training events in Yakima were the highlight of gunnery training, while a Soldiers' Christmas and a very successful St. Barbara's Day Dinner rounded out the morale-building social activities within the Regiment. Lieutenant-Colonel Ian Watt was appointed as Commanding Officer in the spring, and CWO Lisa Kachonaski was appointed to the position of Regimental Sergeant-Major in the autumn.

Regimental Composition

155 Battery, the 5 Field Band, and HQ & Services operated out of Bay Street Armoury in Victoria and trained simultaneously on Tuesday nights. 156 Battery operated as a troop and continued to parade on Tuesdays out of Brigadier D.R. Sargent Armoury in Nanaimo. All soldiers regularly trained and celebrated together throughout 2023, creating a unified regimental team environment despite the geographic distance between unit locations. The 5th Field Regimental School continued to offer local training opportunities for Gunners in British Columbia.

Collective Training

The Regiment conducted training to achieve Battle Task Standards to be able to deploy the unit effectively. The work done during the previous training year was further refined by more dry training in March during Ex SKILLED GUNNER 2, followed by Ex CLAYMORE STEEL 23 again at the Yakima Training Centre to confirm our ability to conduct basic fire missions, fire planning, open actions, and harassing fire - specifically focusing on fire planning and conducting more complex missions. Soldiers trained locally in a dry deployment exercise, Ex SKILLED GUNNER 1, in September in preparation for the live-fire Ex CAUSTIC SHOCK at Yakima Training Centre in Washington State in October.

Individual Training

The Regiment conducted IT courses and training throughout the year in support of 39 CBG's Continuous Individual Training Year plan and con-

ducted its own courses in unit lines as part of our Regimental School. The Regiment focused on junior leadership to develop the growing number of Master Bombardiers and qualified Detachment Commanders.

Community Events

Members of all batteries have been active in the community, supporting Island and Brigade recruiting efforts. Open House activities at Bay Street Armoury focused on the C3 Howitzer, the Mortar, the IFT room, and a performance by the Band. The Band ran an additional Open House for brass and reed musicians; this was the most successful such event in recent memory, and one which resulted in new members joining and new civilian volunteers attending. Members augmented the Regular Force Naden Band on numerous individual taskings and larger band perfor-

mances on Vancouver Island and in support of military parades and activities. As in past years, the Regiment fired the starting round at the CFB



Esquimalt Navy Run in June. The Regiment also participated in the Vancouver Island Exhibition in August, displaying the 81mm Mortar and MSVS. In what is becoming a tradition, members participated, in uniform, in the Polar Plunge as the largest recognisable contingent at this popular Victoria fundraising event.

Ceremonial

The Regiment participated in three Gun Salutes in 2023: Victoria Day, Canada Day, and Remembrance Day.

Operations

2023 provided plenty of opportunity for participation in domestic operations, and members served in British Columbia, fighting forest fires from staging areas in Burns Lake and Vanderhoof, and one member participated in Op PALACI in Rogers Pass. The regiment also saw three members deploy for Op REASSURANCE in Latvia.

Conclusion

The year was one of growth in numbers, and this necessitated a high degree of commitment from instructors, particularly at the MBdr, Sgt, and Lt level. The Regiment is putting into place a bold and aggressive plan to rebuild the “missing middle” of the Regiment (a concern across the entire Army), and it is doing so with a solid succession and training plan in place under the supervision of the RSM. The Regiment has demonstrated flexibility and resilience and is set to now capitalise on the growth that we are finally seeing again through the inflow of new recruits.

Puis, le 25 janvier, les membres du régiment ont reçu une instruction de soir sur la préparation à une guerre hivernale. Le mois s'est terminé avec le CPX 3, du 28 et 29 janvier. Ce fût l'occasion pour le 6 RAC de s'exercer sur les manœuvres d'artillerie en contexte hivernale.

Le mois de février, pour sa part, a débuté avec une activité, le 4 février, sur le simulateur de tir d'armes légères (STALL) au Manège Militaire de Montmagny. Une grande partie des nouvelles recrues ont pu découvrir l'équipement de simulateur de tir à notre disposition pour l'entraînement sur la C7 et la C9. Les membres ont eu l'occasion de pratiquer le drill sur le Carl Gustav et celles du 9mm. Lors de la soirée d'entraînement du 15 février, ce fût la préparation en vue de l'exercice OBUS POLAIRE. Les membres présents ont appris les bases pour le transport d'équipement, sur traineau, en situation de guerre hivernale. La fin de semaine du 17 au 19 février était l'occasion pour nos membres de mettre en pratique les différentes instructions reçues dans les derniers mois, dans les secteurs de la BFC de Valcartier. Ainsi, conjointement au 2 RAC, les deux régiments ont dû affronter la rigueur de l'hiver dans l'exercice OBUS POLAIRE dans un contexte de combat urbain. Ils ont dû réaliser la construction d'ouvrages défensifs en plus de tester leur efficacité avec des tirs réels d'armes légères. De plus, nos artilleurs ont courageusement affronté l'hiver et ont dormi sous la tente à l'extérieur. La soirée d'instruction du 22 février était destinée aux membres de la CPS afin de recevoir une introduction au fonctionnement et aux rôles de l'artillerie (PC, Reconnaissance, OP et Pièces), la visualisation d'une position d'artillerie sur une carte, ainsi que de la théorie et des pratiques sur la Discipline de Tir. Le mois s'est terminé avec un cours de soins pour les membres nécessitant



la mise à jour de leur NIAC.

Au mois de mars, il y a eu d'instruction pour la CPS sur la munition et des explications sur le fonctionnement de l'obusier 105 C3. Les nouveaux membres ont reçu différentes formations de base sur les réclamations possibles, les feuilles de paies, les communications dans les médias, le rôle du Padre au Régiment, les bases du guidage d'un véhicule du MDN et le fonctionnement de l'EETP et de la TEII. Avait lieu également, dans ce mois, l'exercice OBUS POLAIRE (rafale blanche), du 17 au 19 mars, dans les secteurs de la BFC de Valcartier. Le 6 RAC, de concert avec le 2 RAC et le 62 RAC, ont unis leur force dans le dernier grand exercice à tirs réels de l'année, OBUS ENDURCI (GPE 3). Environ 500 obus ont été tirés durant cette fin de semaine. Le but de cet exercice était de mettre à l'épreuve l'habileté et la rapidité du personnel lors de différentes missions de tir et de l'exécution de la reconnaissance. Nous en avons profité pour procéder à la compétition annuelle de tir entre les régiments d'artilleries de la Réserve, du Québec. Le grand gagnant de cette compétition fût un détachement composé de membres du 62 RAC et du 2 RAC ayant à sa barre, le sergent Désilet, du 62 RAC. La Sgt Lemieux, RAPU de l'unité, a également invitée deux journalistes à prendre part à l'exercice afin d'en rédiger un article et réaliser une vidéo sur le métier d'artilleur dans la réserve. Nous avons également eu la visite de l'équipe marketing du CRFC qui ont réalisé un travail d'imagerie pour la promotion des emplois dans

les Forces. Le sujet de la soirée d'instruction du 22 mars de la CPS s'est déroulé autour de la topographie, la préparation d'une carte personnelle et l'explication des signes conventionnels sur celle-ci. Le mois s'est finalement terminé avec l'Exercice PARAGE NOVICE ayant lieu au Manège Militaire de Lévis. Le but était de se préparer à générer des troupes dans les conditions et délais optimaux dans l'éventualité d'une opération nationale.

Le mois d'avril, quant à lui, a débuté avec la continuité de l'Exercice PARAGE NOVICE qui avait lieu, cette fois-ci, au 35 Bon Svc de St-Malo. L'Adjum Cloutier a profité de l'occasion pour remettre une promotion aux Artilleurs Mombo et Cyr, passant ainsi au grade de Bombardiers. Le LCol Côté en a également profité pour remettre la promotion tant attendue du Sgt Labbé passant, pour sa part, au grade d'Adjutant. De plus, certains de nos membres étaient, ce jour-là, sur l'exercice RÉACTION NATIONALE de la 34e GBC, qui avait pour but de préparer les membres présents aux différents scénarios possibles dans un déploiement opérationnel au niveau national. Puis, avait lieu, le 5 avril, l'instruction en soirée donnée par l'équipe de la 4e Compagnie du Renseignement, du CI 2Div, faisant état de la situation géopolitique du moment. Cette instruction a permis aux membres d'être plus informés sur les différents conflits internationaux qui sont surveillés par les FAC. Pour la soirée d'instruction du 19 avril, le BSM, Adjum Cloutier, a mis ses connaissances en combat corps-à-corps au profit des membres du régiment en offrant une mise à jour des techniques de combat sans arme. Puis, dans celle du 26 avril, les membres de la 59e Batterie ont pu faire une activité de cohésion autour d'un match amical de Dek Hockey, au PSP de la BFC de Valcartier, tandis que les membres de la CPS ont pratiqué leur drill sur la C7, en vue du

champ de tir à venir. D'ailleurs, le mois s'est conclu avec le champ de tir (CT) de C7, C9 et 9mm, sur la BFC de Valcartier.

Par la suite, le mois de mai a marqué le début de l'EETP pour les membres du 6 RAC. Plusieurs membres passent alors en classe B pour la période estivale. La fin de semaine du 6 et 7 mai a été dédiée à la pratique de la Gun Drill pour les tirs du Salut à venir. Certains des membres ont également mis à jour leur formation pour le NIAC des Premiers Soins. Le 13 mai avait lieu le BBQ régimentaire du défi du Cmdt. Les membres ont pu se réunir une dernière fois avant le début des cours sur la TEII, et pour certains, avant les vacances. Les activités du mois se sont terminées avec le tir du Salut, le 22 mai, à la Citadelle de Québec, pour souligner le jour de la fête de la Reine.

Les mois d'automne ont été extrêmement occupés avec de nombreux exercices de tir réel tels que GPE 1 et GPE 2 en partenariat avec le 62e RAC à Shawinigan et le 2e Régiment de campagne à Montréal. Plusieurs membres de l'unité ont également participé à un exercice de tir réel à Gagetown pour appuyer le cours de l'IG.

Le Capt Drouin a été nommé commandant de la 59e Bie. L'Adj Fugere, Adj Ouellet, et l'Adj Cloutier ont été promus au grade d'Adjum.

6 RAC continue de s'efforcer de produire des artilleurs efficaces ! Nous avons eu une année chargée, mais notre dévouement et notre formation continue ont porté leurs fruits puisque 19 membres de notre unité ont été nommés pour le déploiement sur l'opération RÉASSURANCE en 2024.

38 Brigade Artillery Tactical Group (38 ATG) consists of three units across three provinces: 10th Field Artillery Regiment, consisting of 18 Bty in Regina, SK, and 64 Bty in Yorkton, SK; 26th Field Artillery Regiment, consisting of 71 Bty in Brandon, MB, and 13 Bty in Portage la Prairie, MB; and 116th Independent Field Battery, in Kenora, ON. This year has been positive for 38 ATG with some of its members volunteering to serve overseas and on domestic operations. The overseas Operations included Op REASSURANCE in Latvia, Op UNIFIER in Ukraine, and Op IMPACT in the Middle East. Domestic operations included Op GOLDEN ORB, Op LENTUS, and Op PALACI.

Celebrations and Events

Likely the most memorable event of the year was the coronation of His Majesty, King Charles III on 6 May. This event was marked by royal salutes across Canada and the Commonwealth, and 38 ATG contributed with two-gun salutes of its own; one in Winnipeg and one in Regina.

Soldiers of the ATG attended Remembrance Day services in Regina, Yorkton, Brandon, Portage la Prairie, and Kenora. Additionally, a gun

salute was fired in Regina as part of their Remembrance Day services.

The year concluded with the annual Ex MERRY BARBARA just before the year-end holidays. The ATG congregated in Brandon where the members took part in PD sessions on interoperability and survivability and enjoyed the Soldiers' Appreciation Dinner. The weekend-long event successfully raised the morale of those in attendance and marked the end of the work year for both reservists and regular force members.

Training Exercises & Deployments

The 2023 training calendar was filled with domestic and international operations, deployments, and training exercises.

Capt Killam deployed on Op IMPACT in Iraq demonstrating yet another example of the dedication of ATG. Members of 38 ATG also volunteered to serve overseas on Op REASSURANCE in Latvia. The ATG had several soldiers deployed in support of Op REASSURANCE including as Detachment Commanders on the M777.



Domestic operations this year included Op PALACI. Op PALACI's Roto 1 began in Nov 2022 and continued until 13 Feb 2023; Roto 2 concluded on 29 Feb 2023. Participating members worked with Parks Canada to prevent uncontrolled avalanches from blocking major routes in Rogers Pass. This was the first time that Reservists were responsible for Op PALACI, a further example of the reliability of Army Reserve soldiers.

Ex FROZEN GUNNER occurred from 3-31 March 2023 with the intent to train members in their roles with a focus on winter survival and combat readiness. The ATG and 1 RCHA worked together in a Regimental context and included firing EPLARS missions.

Ex TEMPEST GUNNER occurred from 21-23 April 2023. ATG members deployed in support of a 1 and 3 Field Artillery Regiments exercise. The exercise gave ATG members a great opportunity to work with different units and to see new ways of conducting training.

Near the end of summer, 38 ATG conducted Ex WESTERN GUNNER from 19-27 Aug 2023. The purpose of this exercise was to ultimately improve survivability and increase interoperability with great support from the RCAS. The provided a tremendous amount of experiential training. 1 RCHA supported the exercise with C Bty assets, allowing the ATG to conduct MUAS-fired missions. The exercise culminated with the 26 Field Pipes and Drums playing at the end-of-exercise smoker.

Ex LIMBER GUNNER took place from 20-22 Oct 2023. The ATG deployed a Bty under 1 RCHA to conduct regimental missions and strengthening the relationship between 1 RCHA and 38 ATG.

As already mentioned, Ex MERRY BARBARA was held from 8-10 December 2023 and focussed on resilience-related PD sessions.

Major Courses

There were a significant number of courses conducted this year both in the unit and at 3 CDTC Det Shilo. Courses included communications, GJLC, DP1 – Artillery Detachment Member (Common), DP1 – C3, Gun Detachment Commander and Detachment Second-in-Command, and FOO Module 1.

Notable Members of 2023

After thirty years with 26 Field Artillery Regt (26 Fd), and almost 20 years of that as part of 38 ATG, CWO Lelond handed the RSM's pace stick to incoming RSM, CWO Henry, during Ex LIMBER GUNNER. Through his military career, CWO Lelond has demonstrated the highest values expected of its soldiers. The ATG will certainly miss CWO Lelond; we express our sincere appreciation for his dedicated service and wish him all the best in the future.

At the same time, the ATG welcomes CWO Henry as the new RSM. CWO Henry brings 39 years of dedicated service to the guns of The Royal Regiment in both the Regular Force and the Reserve and with multiple international tours. What this really means is that CWO Henry brings an immense amount of experience from which the soldiers and officers of the ATG can learn from. Again, CWO Henry, we welcome you.

MWO Kim Wheatland, OMM, CD, retired this year, having served a total of 35 years with the CAF. 20 of those years were spent working full-time with 26 Fd, in Brandon. She was instrumental in many unit-based events such as the Annual Military Ball. Her dedication and hard work did not go unnoticed, and she will undoubtedly be missed. The ATG wishes her well in her retirement.

The 11th Field Artillery Regiment, RCA, (11 Fd) experienced a successful and eventful year marked by engaging training activities and significant regimental events. The artillery training for 2023 commenced with Ex POLAR GUNNER, where 11 Fd deployed to the challenging winter terrain of the 4th Canadian Division Training Centre in Meaford to enhance soldier skills in cold weather environments.

In March, the regiment undertook Ex INTREPID GUNNER at CFB Petawawa. This involved live-fire missions and planning in new and unfamiliar terrain and presented an exciting challenge for navigation and observation post drills. In April, the regiment sent more than 50 soldiers in support of

Ex ARROWHEAD RESPONSE, a 31 CBG-led exercise to simulate a domestic operation. It involved over 600 soldiers that deployed across Southwestern Ontario. 11 Fd transitioned to Reserve Summer Training (RST) in June and took the lead on the GATS Mods 2-3 and DP 1 courses. Over the summer, over 35 soldiers were sent as either instructor or exercise staff. For the final exercise, Ex SUMMER GUNNER 3, 11 Fd provided considerable support including vehicles. Concurrent to Ex SUMMER GUNNER 3, 11 Fd provided 29 soldiers to the banner activity for 31 CBG: Ex ARROWHEAD GUARDIAN. During this concentration of over 12 units and 800 soldiers from 31 CBG, the regiment contributed to live and dry effects in the Meaford training area. This dynamic exercise not only tested the unit's tactical capabilities but also fostered teamwork and readiness amongst other units within the brigade. This achievement of force generation demonstrated the regiment's ability to deploy in support of multiple aims and its dedication to nurturing the skills and qualifications of Gunners across Ontario.

After the summer training period, the unit achieved IBTS in September through weekly training and Ex SPARTAN GUNNER, a live small arms range at CFB Borden. The momentum continued with Ex AUTUMN GUNNER, a multi-unit, live-fire cooperation exercise with 30th and 42nd Field Artillery Regiments at CFB Petawawa. Once again, the unit proved its ability to master the logistical challenges of a large range deployment for the third time in the calendar year. Ex PROTECTIVE THUNDER in November at 4 CDTC Meaford served as the final confirmation exercise for a Gun Detachment Commander training package that was conducted over weeks of unit training nights and two exercises and qualified six junior leaders to the rank of Sergeant. The successful completion of this course not only reflects the regiment's emphasis on continuous learning and development but also highlights its proficiency in executing comprehensive training programs. The training for calendar year 2023 concluded with Ex OLYMPIC GUNNER, confirming basic soldier fieldcraft skills in engaging and competition-based activities at The Guelph Grotto Climbing Co.

Throughout the year, 11 Fd executed several memorable events, fostering camaraderie and celebrating significant moments. Beginning with a New Year's Day Levée on January 1st, the regiment set the tone for shared experiences. The Master Bombardiers' Night in January hon-



oured the accomplishments of the regiment's junior leaders, followed by a formal gala hosted by 11th Battery in the Hamilton area. The Special Guest Night Mess Dinner on May 6th, following the coronation ceremony, featured the attendance of the Deputy Regimental Colonel, LCol Insley, as the Guest of Honour. The Commanding Officer's Leadership Dinner welcomed back the newly qualified junior leaders from RST in September, while the Saint Barbara's Day Mess Dinner in December commemorated regimental traditions. The annual soldier appreciation dinner included a holiday meal, honours, and awards, with notable achievements such as Top Junior NCO awarded to Cpl Serediuk, Top Senior NCO to Sgt Sargent, and the Top Junior Officer presented to Lt Sharma. The BC's Pennant for 2023 was awarded to Bdr Olesen's detachment.

11 Fd made a notable contribution to Canada's missions at home and abroad during 2023 with Maj Prentice and MCpl Mulder deployed on Op IMPACT in vital headquarters roles as the J3 and the HQ Orderly Room Second-in-Command, respectively. Sgt Jackson supported a last-minute vacancy to Op UNIFIER as the J4 Supply, a position well above her rank of Sgt. At the end of 2023, the regiment had four members currently deployed across Ops IMPACT, REASSURANCE, and PALACI. The unit is incredibly proud of the response of its members during the call for overseas and domestic operations. Though many more raised their hands to support, the unit provided a notable contribution to the national efforts when given the positions to do so.

2023 marked the most active year since the COVID-19 Pandemic in terms of community outreach. The most notable activity occurred on May 6th, when 11 Fd supported the City of Guelph's Coronation Ceremony for King Charles III by providing a 21-gun salute at York Road Park. This activity consisted of a parade contingent with cadets, Legion members, and active service members and saw over 200 citizens and local govern-

ment officials in attendance. The unit collaborated frequently with the Serving Scholars program at the University of Guelph, highlighted by the marquee activity during the Homecoming football game, where the unit personnel participated in the opening ceremonies. This included Gnr Milligan who was dressed in pads instead of CADPAT as a starting defensive lineman for the Guelph team. The unit held multiple open houses for local emergency services, local high schools in support of the coop program, the Supercrawl festival, and H-Great, a military tattoo held in Hamilton. The level of participation with the community demonstrated the unit's trust and respect within the Guelph and Hamilton areas.

The regiment, with a deep sense of honour and commitment, actively participated in Remembrance Day activities at various poignant locations in the surrounding communities. This year, the unit was honoured to have the Colonel Commandant, BGen (ret'd) Patterson, join the regiment for the ceremonies in Guelph. The solemnity of the occasion was profoundly observed across the unit's area of responsibility, to include the Sleeman Centre, the John McCrae Memorial Gardens, Woodlawn Cemetery, War Memorial Hall, Legions in Dundas and Guelph, and Gore Park. Through these heartfelt activities, the regiment demonstrated unwavering respect for the memory of the brave souls who have shaped the course of history, embodying the essence of Remembrance Day.

In 2023, the unit resumed regular operational tempo in training, social events, and community outreach, marking a fantastic year for the unit and its troops. When called upon, the unit delivered incredible successes in all realms of force generation and training. When appropriate, the unit reinforced its value to the community through presence and service. 11 Fd is proud of the work of its Gunners in 2023 and greatly looks forward to maintaining its momentum into 2024.

In 2023, The 15th Field Artillery Regiment, RCA, (15 Fd) operated with full blast. The regiment's unwavering dedication and persistence through the previous year's unprecedented trials proved to further strengthen its excellence. The regiment embraced a relentless pursuit of training, exercises, and development.

The year started with members perfecting their winter fieldcraft and winter-warfare skills and performing various drills and tasks in garrison to ultimately prepare Ex ARCHANGEL GUNNER, the regiment's annual winter exercise. The winter indoctrination training instilled discipline and confidence to members under extreme weather conditions, which would prepare the regiment's members for their crucial tasking—Op PALACI. Every year, an average of 12 metres of snow accumulates at Rogers Pass, British Columbia, disrupting the Trans-Canada Highway and the Canadian Pacific Railway and grounding more than 4,000 motor vehicles and 40 trains daily. The cost of these disruptions amounts to billions of dollars to Canadians. 15 Fd deployed Capt Lloyd, MBdr Massicotte, Bdr Findlay, Bdr Mischenko, and Bdr Steele to serve in Op PALACI between Nov 2022 and April 2023, keeping Canadian roads safe and vital logistics of commercial traffic operational.

2 February 2023 marked 15 Fd's 103rd birthday. Steeped in rich history and tradition, this milestone marks a century-plus of unwavering service and dedication. This year, the regiment was made proud with WO Palmer receiving the 74th Order of Military Merit.

Moving into the Spring, the regiment shifted its focus to perfecting artillery drills. Members practiced endlessly, mastering every detail leading up to the live-fire exercise. Ex CLAYMORE STEELE was conducted in Yakima, Washington. For the first time in a decade, this exercise included the 5th Field Artillery Regiment, RCA, (5 Fd) and ran for two consecutive weekends. Gunnery was not the only skill being practiced as our friends from

the U.S. Military joined us to perform airlift CASEVAC training. These exercises exposed members to operations with other coalition countries and allowed them to familiarize with foreign equipment.

Our guns needed rest from a full season of firing, but our members were still eager. The regiment now zeroed in on its rifle marksmanship, and members participated in Ex SNIPING GUNNER II. Members of the band and battery participated in PWT1 and PWT3 C7 live-fire shoot, respectively. Infantry skills were being polished again in preparation for another immediate exercise the same week as Ex SPECTRE COMMANDER. Basic soldier skills were now put to the test as members operated from a Forward Operating Base, where they were dispatched to complete reconnaissance missions, urban assault drills, and close quarter combat techniques against each other. This intensive infantry training would soon prove valuable as the annual brigade exercise was approaching.

Ex COUGAR SIEGE was the annual brigade exercise where the regiment's skills were put in practice. This tactical exercise involved armoured and infantry units assaulting and defending multiple objectives. The regiment participated as fire support for the advancement of friendly forces, developing accurate fire plans, manoeuvring gun positions, and effectively locating enemy positions. This exercise utilized the WES laser system simulating combat, which put more emphasis on accuracy, discipline, and tactical soundness. Members were well-prepared for this exercise through consistent training and gained valuable experience operating in a battle group.

On 17 May 2023, the 15 Fd celebrated a Change of Command with a parade. LCol N.J. Watts passed the position of Commanding Officer to LCol A.W. Grieve who

was promoted from the rank of Major and was the previous Second-In-Command for the regiment.

As the summer months approached, the regiment stood down. Members pursued further development by participating in courses. The summer also welcomed back many members from the regiment who were previously deployed overseas. Bdr Chan, Bdr Kramer, and Bdr J. Wong were de-

Wong deployed on Op LENTUS to support provincial and territorial authorities amidst the blazes.

As the fall season approached, members returned from their summer courses. The regiment focused on Individual Battle Task Standards and infantry skills, once again strengthening the rudimentary foundations of a soldier. Gas Hut training was performed on Ex SNIPING GUNNER II in September, introducing a more advanced practical drill than previous year's theoretical lectures.

The regiment would turn their focus towards gunnery skills right away as a revisit to Yakima, Washington, with 5 Fd to participate in Ex CAUSTIC SHOCK was fast approaching. As the summer courses produced many new gunners and gun det commanders, this exercise gave these members the perfect opportunity to familiarize themselves operating in the regiment's battery.

The guns would rest while the members closed out the last live-fire exercise of the year at SNIPING GUNNER II in October. Members of the band and battery once again practiced their PWT 1 and PWT 3 C7 Carbine live-fire shoot, respectively.

As the year came to an end, the regiment conducted its annual Remembrance Day salute, again, at Hallelujah Point, Stanley Park. 15 Fd remembers those who paid the ultimate sacrifice for peace. Lest we forget.

Ending the year 2023, members of the regiment gathered to celebrate the

holidays with the Soldiers' Appreciation Dinner. The Commanding Officer's Commendations were given out to the following members of the year: WO Palmer, MBdr Baird, and Cpl Lokay.

15 Fd ended 2023 showcasing unparalleled prowess in joint exercises, individual training, and member achievements. The regiment looks forward to continuing its commitment to all aspects of development, including basic soldier skills and gunnery excellence. The regiment had an exceptional year and looks forward to facing all challenges in 2024.

It is said that hindsight is 20/20, and, as such, 2023 can be clearly seen as one of the busiest years in recent history. While we approached 2023 with a more seasoned Command Team, the eye was towards international events and the anticipated readiness levels of 20th Field Artillery Regiment, RCA (20 Fd).

2023 was another great year for training. Near the end of January, the Regiment ran a Cold Weather Operator exercise, which focused more on operating a bivouac within a winter environment. This exercise included tactical deployment of a bivouac site in a heavily wooded area, presence patrols, and night operations. This was essential practice for soldiers looking at going on their PLQ later during the year or newly promoted soldiers to practice their leadership skills.

In mid-March, the Regiment conducted Ex NORTHERN TIGER III at JMTC Grayling, Michigan, United States. This live-fire artillery exercise focused on bringing the guns into action in a winter environment as well as indirect, night fire shoots. This tested soldiers' abilities in different fire missions, including artillery knowledge. After this, the Regiment switched to IBTS-related training to prepare for the annual IBTS exercise—Ex STRIKING TIGER I—to have the Regiment complete its mandatory weapons handling testing.

In May, four members of the Regiment and four members from other artillery regiments successfully qualified as Recce Techs on a locally run course consisting of both modules. In support of this course, 30 Bty conducted training with a focus on night and day deployments with the battery, allowing members of the Recce Tech course more opportunities to practice operating in different environments.

During the summer, the Regiment was able to send 18 members away on various courses such as BMQ, C3 Det Commander, C3 Det 2 IC, Gunner JLC, DP1 Arty, Pipes and Drums QL5, GATSM, Recce Tech, and CP Tech. In September, the Regiment started up with a CO's welcome-back parade and unit AARV. The following week would see the Regiment commence weapons training, leading up to the IBTS live-fire exercise in Grayling, Michigan.

There were some key appointment changes for the Regiment in the fall months. The first occurred on 4 November during our live artillery exercise, Ex NORTHERN TIGER II when WO St. John handed over the BSM appointment to WO Hocken. Gnr Warnock was promoted to Bdr in the field during the same change of appointment parade.

The Regiment and the Regimental Pipes and Drums also participated in the annual Remembrance Day ceremonies. The Regiment marched to the Sault Ste. Marie Cenotaph from the GFL Memorial Gardens and conducted a short Remembrance Day ceremony, which included a flyover by Sault College Aviation. Concluding the ceremony at the Cenotaph, the Regiment, again with the Pipes and Drums, marched back to the GFL Memorial Gardens to continue with the Remembrance Day ceremony.

The morning started off with two presentations: the first being the Cenotaphs in Canada and their history by Rev. Phil Miller, and the second being history of the Canadian Artillery by Col (Retired) Clyde Healey. A concluding presentation was provided by Lt. Cody Dias with the story of St. Barbara. The Regiment then stood down for lunch before engaging in a friendly, camaraderie-building competition for the St. Barbara's Day trophy.

As the year came to an end, the Regiment gathered for the Soldiers' Appreciation Dinner. This dinner posed an exceptional turnout of new and past-serving members. The Regi-



20th Independent Field Battery's (20 IFB) year has been marked by significant deployments, commendable promotions, and a plethora of training exercises showcasing the unit's commitment to excellence.

Eight members were deployed in support of firefighting efforts during Op LENTUS. Additionally, three members contributed to Op PALACI, while one member deployed on Op UNIFIER. The unit supported Op CHINTEX in the City of Lethbridge and sent twelve members to participate in Ex WESTERN GUNNER. A C3 howitzer from 20 IFB was provided for the 2023-2024 Op PALACI rotations.

Kicking off the year with a commitment to excellence, the unit participated in Ex SNOWBALL GUNNER, a comprehensive winter warfare course held at Chinook Lake in the Crowsnest Pass. 2023 was an eventful and fulfilling year for The Royal Canadian Artillery Band. We also welcomed guest artist, Jens Lindemann, on the trumpet for our performance where he commanded the stage with the RCA band's clarinetist, Bdr (ret'd) Joseph Semple in a stunning jazz face-off with each other. Jens Lindemann is an internationally renowned trumpet soloist and teacher who was born and raised here in Edmonton. We loved having the opportunity to have him with us on stage!

As is annual tradition, the RCA Band also participated in this year's Calgary Stampede. This is one of our favourite events of the year as we get to

enjoy the festivities and excitement of the Stampede while also providing musical support for various events.

The RCA Band also continued to provide musical support for the Lord Strathcona's Horse (Royal Canadians) at their annual event at Spruce Meadows in Calgary with the Strathcona Mounted Troop, a volunteer display unit that is reminiscent of the Lord Strathcona's Horse in the nineteen twenties and thirties. This is a major event for the LdSH(RC), and the RCA band is proud and honoured to provide ongoing support.

While we rehearse and perform as a full parade and concert band most often, we also have various small ensembles formed by members of the band. Our Brass Quintet and Woodwind Quintet were busy engaging in community outreach promoting the RCA Band and the CAF throughout the year. Both quintets performed at various mess dinners and military functions at Edmonton Garrison, and in October they held a joint concert at the University of Alberta's Convocation Hall. The Brass Quintet also went on tour across southern Alberta and Saskatchewan, performing at various schools and university music faculties. The Brass Quintet also went on tour again in November, this time to Jasper to support the Jasper Veteran's Appreciation Event over the week leading up to Remembrance Day.

Various promotions and awards were also given out to deserving members throughout the course of 2023. Several members of the band received the Alberta Queen's Platinum Jubilee Medal, MBdr Samantha Hunt was promoted to their current rank, and 2 Lt Rob Johnson received their commission, moving on from the NCO ranks to become the band's Assistant Director of Music. Another significant event occurred in September when we welcomed the Band of the Household Cavalry from the United Kingdom to Edmonton Garrison. The week they spent with us included joint rehearsals of nearly 80 musicians in our band room and culminated in joint concerts at West Edmonton Mall and the Shell Theatre in Fort Saskatchewan. The

Four of our reservists were also successful with their Music Branch auditions. After

audition season was over, we had a short amount of time to prepare for our Remembrance Ceremony which was held in support of the Jasper Place Legion at the Ice Palace in West Edmonton Mall. A bustling crowd gathered for the ceremony; local units, cadets, politicians, and community members who organized and shared their words at the ceremony were well-received.

Our year finished with our annual holiday concert at the Winspear Centre to a sold-out hall in support of the Edmonton Military Family Resource Center. The band performed a multitude of holiday favourites including a narrated rendition of *The Night before Christmas* and *The Twelve Days of Christmas* with the audience singing along. The Holiday Concert is one of our most cherished events of the year, and we are grateful to perform at the Winspear and honoured that we can hold the free concert in support of the MFRC.

The RCA Museum recorded 4,500 visitors at the museum in 2023, an increase of a thousand from the previous year. Most visitors came during the summer, with the numbers decreasing in the fall and winter. Our staff conducted dozens of guided tours for the public and military personnel. Our website is active with over 250,000 unique hits and we continue to add new content in English and French. We produce our newsletter quarterly, which is available on our website. Our Twitter and Facebook accounts are active and receive positive feedback.

Clive Prothero-Brooks retired in August 2023 after serving for fifty years in the CAF and DND, including 23 years at the RCA Museum. Clive was the curator at the RCA Museum from 2000 to 2002 and has been the collection manager since 2003. His retirement marks the end of an era and the culmination of decades of hard work. We honour his fifty years of service and well-deserved retirement.

We closed our Peacemaking Exhibit in August 2023, which was well received since it opened in September 2022. On Friday, September 8, 2023, we opened our WW2 vehicle display, which showcases military vehicles used by Canadians during the Second World War. These vehicles provided firepower, logistical support, mobility, and protection for the Canadian Army, which enhanced their effectiveness during the war. Jonathan Ferguson, our senior curator, is updating the Gunner Gallery permanent exhibit, which includes approximately eighty metal sets, opening in February 2024.

In 2023, the RCA Museum participated in many outreach events. Our museum participated in the 1 RCHA Summer Ball on 26 May 2023 with a vehicle and gun display. We hosted the RCA Band on Saturday, 27 May. We also had two displays at the Gunner Reunion from 29 June to 1 July. We participated in the Austin Reunion & Stampede with a large vehicle and gun display from 27 July to 30 July.

The RCA Museum continues to be financially sound. We received a generous financial contribution from Dr. Janice Nicholls Goerzen, who also donated a WW2 collection from her late father, which is on display in our Manitoba Gallery. Dale Murray continues to donate military decorations that help us to tell the story of the Canadian Gunner.

With the support of the City of Lahr in Germany, two retired gunners, Lieutenant Commander Khristian Kowalski and Master Bombardier Jim Daynard, recovered and shipped a hand painted RCHA badge on a metal plate from the former Canadian Forces Base Lahr. Sergeant Roger Eppert hand-painted the RCHA badge or Garter badge on the wall of building B-67 at CFB Lahr in 1985. We displayed this badge at the RCA Reunion in the summer of 2023 and in our permanent Cold War gallery.

In 2023, our curators updated thirty-eight gun and vehicle signs throughout the museum and gun park. Many of the signs were aging and required new signage. We continue to complete research requests, including assisting Justice Canada with historical information. We are adding more Indigenous content and doing our best to research the history of the Canadian Gunner.

Le Musée de l'Artillerie royale canadienne (Musée de l'ARC) a accueilli 4 500 visiteurs et visiteuses en 2023, soit mille de plus que l'année précédente. La plupart de ces personnes sont venues pendant l'été, le nombre de visites ayant connu une diminution en automne et en hiver. Notre personnel a effectué des dizaines de visites guidées pour le grand public et les militaires. Notre site web est actif et reçoit plus de 250 000 visites uniques. Nous continuons d'y ajouter du nouveau contenu en anglais et en français. Nous publions entre autres notre infolettre trimestrielle sur notre site web. De plus, nos comptes Twitter et Facebook sont actifs et reçoivent des commentaires positifs.

Clive Prothero-Brooks a pris sa retraite en août 2023, après avoir servi pendant cinquante ans au sein des FAC et du MDN, dont 23 ans passés au Musée de l'ARC. Clive a été conservateur du Musée de l'ARC de 2000 à 2002 et était gestionnaire des collections depuis 2003. Son départ à la retraite marque la fin d'une époque et l'aboutissement de décennies de travail acharné. Nous rendons hommage à ses cinquante années de service et soulignons sa retraite bien méritée.

Nous avons fermé notre exposition sur le maintien de la paix en août 2023, qui a reçu un bon accueil depuis son ouverture, en septembre 2022. Par la suite, le vendredi 8 septembre 2023, nous avons inauguré notre exposition de véhicules de la Seconde Guerre mondiale, qui présente des véhicules militaires utilisés par les troupes canadiennes pendant la Deuxième Guerre mondiale. À l'époque, les véhicules militaires fournissent de la puissance de feu, du soutien logistique et de la protection à l'Armée canadienne, ce qui en améliore l'efficacité. Jonathan Ferguson, notre conservateur principal, met à jour l'exposition permanente de la Galerie de l'artilleur. Elle comprend environ 80 ensembles métalliques et ouvrira en février 2024.


En 2023, le musée RCA a aussi participé à de nombreuses activités de sensibilisation. Notre musée entre autres présenté, le 26 mai 2023, des véhicules et des armes à l'occasion du Bal d'été du 1 RCHA. Nous avons aussi accueilli la Musique de l'Artillerie royale canadienne le samedi 27 mai. De plus, nous avons présenté deux expositions lors de la Réunion des artilleurs qui s'est tenue du 29 juin au 1er juillet. Par la suite, du 27 au 30 juillet, nous avons participé à l'Austin Reunion & Stampede en y présentant une grande exposition de véhicules et d'armes à feu.

La situation financière du Musée de l'ARC reste saine. Nous avons reçu une généreuse contribution financière de Janice Nicholls Goerzen, PhD. Cette dernière a également fait don de la collection de son défunt père, qui date de la Seconde Guerre mondiale et est exposée dans la Galerie du Manitoba. Dale Murray continue également de faire don de décorations militaires qui nous aident à raconter l'histoire de l'artilleur canadien.

Avec l'appui de la ville de Lahr, en Allemagne, le capitaine de corvette Khristian Kowalski et le bombardier-chef Jim Daynard, deux artilleurs à la retraite, ont récupéré et expédié un insigne du RCHA. Il est peint à la main sur une plaque de métal et provient de l'ancienne Base des Forces canadiennes (BFC) Lahr. Le sergent Roger Eppert a peint à la main l'insigne du RCHA, ou l'insigne de l'Ordre de la Jarretière, sur le mur du bâtiment B-67 de la BFC Lahr en 1985. Nous avons exposé cet insigne lors de la Réunion de l'ARC à l'été 2023, puis dans notre galerie permanente sur la Guerre froide.



We also broadcast our Annual General Meeting for our members to join us online or in person.


